WORCESTER DEFEATED IN A HEAVY-BATTING CONTEST. SUNDAY GAMES WILL BE ABANDONED. Owing to the Arrests Yesterday and the Failure of the Railroad to Provide Suitable Accommodations.

The Washingtons yesterday defeated the Worcester team through heavy batting in the fifth inning, when they scored eight runs on some of the hardest hitting ever seen in this locality. Underwood, Jordan, Nicholas, each made singles; Isler, Bird and Wentz made triples; Isler made a double, and Whistler a home run. It was great batting and the crowd howled its approval in stentorian tones.

The arrests at yesterday's game preclude the possibility of playing any more games in that locality. It was the intention of the club to refrain from any more of these games, because the railroad company would not furnish them any accommodations or grant any concessions. It would not give a reduced fare, nor would it stop opposite the entrance to the grounds.

The home team ought to be able to pull up considerably in the pennant race this week. To-day and tomorrow it will play the Hartford, the two following days the Worcester, and on Friday morning the Baltimore team. On Saturday it plays in Wilmington. These six games will be played in the city.

BURIED WITH HONORS.

Federal of John F. Parker. His Connection With a Great Tragedy. The funeral of John Frederick Parker took place yesterday afternoon from his late residence, No. 816 Sixth street northwest. It was attended by Harmony Lodge No. 17, F. A. A. M., with W. Hamilton Smith, worshipful master; L. H. Ginn, senior warden; F. McC. Orin, well, junior warden; O. S. Firman, secretary; L. D. Carman, treasurer, and Samuel Baxter, marshal and master of ceremonies. The services at the house were conducted by Pastor Dorn of St. Paul's English Lutheran Church. The remains were inclosed in a handsome casket, upon which were the deceased's Masonic apron, a sheaf of wheat, and a bunch of cut flowers.

The pallbearers were A. P. Myers, George E. Taylor, John A. Mitchell, J. N. Harris, George W. Harrington and Joshua Stone. Interment was made at Glenwood Cemetery, with Masonic honors, the chaplain, L. H. Youie, officiating. Mr. Parker was born at Winchester, Frederick County, Va. in 1820, and learned the trade of a machinist. He served for a short time during the war, and just before its close he was appointed upon the police force and was on the duty at the box office of Ford's Theatre on the night that President Lincoln was assassinated. He leaves a widow and two married daughters, Mrs. Keyworth and Mrs. Nalley.
