The second inaugural of Mayor John Hylan and his administration heads took place yesterday in City Hall. While the Mayor, surrounded by several hundred city officials, Tammany political leaders, politicians and citizen friends, was being sworn in in the west wing of the building, Murray Hulbert, President of the Board of Aldermen, presided at the charter meeting of the 1922 board in the east wing of the Hall.

Besides the new Aldermanic chamber, Mayor Cabill, Chief of Police Craig, former Governor Alfred E. Smith and Ettore H. La Guardia, the retiring Aldermanic President, made addresses at the aldermanic ceremonies.
