1946 he had been senior instructor at the university's extension course.

He formerly owned a barber-shop in Easton, Md., and in the 1940s he was Democratic representative to the Maryland House of Delegates from Talbot County.

Mr. Larrimore began his career as a volunteer with the Easton Fire Department. He was past


President of the Del-Mar-Va Firemen's Association, made up of the departments from Delaware, Maryland and Virginia on the Eastern Shore. He was a member and formerly on the board of trustees of the Maryland State Firemen's Association. For 15 years he was secre-
