





# **Group Opposes** 3 Comic Books

CHICAGO, April 14 (AP).-A group of mothers surveying comic books and other juvenile reading matter said today it finds "unsatisfactory" three books list-ed as approved by the Comic Code Association of America.

The association is a self-censorship organization of comic sorship organization of comic book publishers and is headed by Charles Murphy of New York. Mrs. Robert Johlic, chairman of the Citizens' Committee for Better Juvenile Literature, said her group has obtained 67 books pronounced fit for newsstand sale by the Comic Code Associa-

tion.
Of 24 examined to date, she said, three were unsatisfactory and two others "borderline."

When all 67 have been surveyed a report will be made to Mr. Murphy, she said. The three books termed unsat-isfactory are "Mad," Wild Bill Hickok" and "Battle Action."

### COMET SIGHTED BY CALIFORNIA **ASTRONOMERS**

California astronomers have found another comet, the National Geographic Society announced today, but you won't be able to see it unless you have a tele-

see t this you have a telescope.

The comet "displays a diffuse tail," the society declared, and is of the 15th magnitude. The unaided eye can see heavenly bodies of the sixth magnitude and larger. larger.
This is the second comet. discovered by George O. Abell in less than a month, Mr. Abell was looking over a picture of the sky made April 13 through the 48-inch Schmidt telescopic camera.

The picture was made as part of the National Geographic Society - Palomar Observatory Sky Survey, "a vast map of the heavens now nearing completion," the so-ciety declared.

Mr. Abell and Robert G Harrington discovered a 17th magnitude comet March 22.
