A 22-year-old food store stock clerk was charged with rape last night on complaint of a WAC stationed at the Forest Glen annex of Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

Held without bond in the Montgomery County jail at Rockville was Herman Hilt Hornsby of the 7000 block of Eighth street N.W., according to Montgomery County police.

Hornsby was arrested after the 90-pound blond arranged to meet him in front of a Silver Spring theater. He was taken into custody by Detective Corps. Harold Treadwell and Ronald J. Loomis. The girl told police she had accepted a ride home with Hornsby, a friend of her boy friend, after the latter failed to show up for a date at the NCO club at Fort Myer Wednesday night. She said the alleged attack occurred in a wooded area near Forest Glen.

Detective Sgt. Kenneth Watkins said the girl reported the alleged assault to Army authorities yesterday after she collapsed while at work.

A hearing has been set for Tuesday in Silver Spring police court. Hornsby is married and the father of a child.

LADY GODIVA RIDE BARRED—TRAFFIC SNARL IS FEARED

COVENTRY, England (NANA).—The long arm of the law has finally caught up with Lady Godiva.

The original lady who, according to legend, wore only her hair when she rode through this midland city as a protest against 11th Century taxes, might be shocked to learn she couldn't possibly do it now.

The modern Godiva case came up when a local movie theater manager applied to the chief constable for permission to allow shapely, 17-year-old Lois Goodhall to ride a horse through the streets to publicize a film. Under her long blond wing, Miss Goodhall, a typist, would wear pink tights, the authorities assured.

Issuing a negative ruling, police explained that they feared traffic would be hopelessly snarled.

3 Missing in Fire At Alcohol Plant

PHILADELPHIA, May 27 (AP).—Workers awaited a go-ahead today to enter an explosion-racked alcohol plant to search for three persons missing in a holocaust that killed one and injured 19 others yesterday.

The men, all Philadelphians, were still unaccounted for following the six-alarm fire which destroyed a unit of the Publicker Industries, Inc., distillery on the Philadelphia waterfront.

Last night, some 12 hours after the blaze began, firemen said the danger of further explosions had passed.

Killed in the fire was Joseph Baker, 55, of Camden, N. J., a Government alcohol tax agent.

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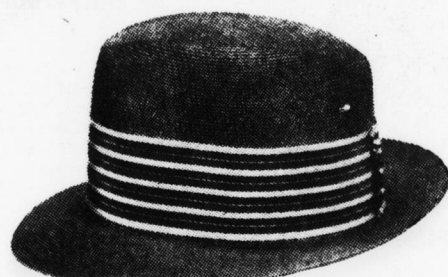
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
