

Birthday Tributes Shower On Police Hero of S.E.

Pvt. Wade G. Baucom of No. 5 precinct, celebrated his 43d birthday today—the personal hero of the Southeast area.

Last night, in the way of a surprise, he received an honorary life membership in the District Congress of Parents and Teachers during a big party in the Brent School, Third and D streets S.E., for the long-time work he has been doing in co-ordinating crossing-patrol work for 11 public and parochial schools and Hine Junior High School. Pvt. Baucom's work has indoctrinated thousands of young school children in the basic principles of traffic safety.

He's been at it for several years now, and it's paid off. He's in his own enthusiasm for the job and the many young lives he's saved. Pvt. Baucom is the epitome of a policeman to all children.

Figuring on Cakes

This was emphasized particularly last night during the party, when the ladies (and men) of the Brent PTA brought out a 6-pound birthday cake for him. On the cake were little figurines of a schoolboy and a girl. They held the hand of a policeman in symbolism. The cake was created by Mrs. George Brazier.

Pvt. Baucom was paid many tributes. They came from Association Supt. of Schools Dr. Carl Hanson; from his lieutenant at No. 5, Joseph Johnson; from the appointed PTA, Baucom to the job of taking care of the youngest fry in the precinct when it came to avoiding traffic hazards with his school patrols.

The plaudits came also, and in considerable numbers, from many ladies of the PTA. Mr. Hansen gave him a framed certificate of tribute in behalf of the District PTA group.

Pvt. Baucom, who lives at 4002 Gallatin street, Hyattsville, Md., was pleasantly surprised. There was a pageant created around him by Mrs. Harry Cressman, president of Brent PTA, and Mrs. Carl Ridenour, its treasurer.

Work Recognized

Mrs. Lorraine G. Knupp, principal of Brent, which has 300 pupils, brought up letters commending Pvt. Baucom. They came from the Commissioners

and Chief of Police Robert V. Murray. They recognized that the job he was doing was an important one. Pvt. Baucom has 22 junior traffic patrol boys and girls in Brent alone.

He was asked to appear at the affair on the pretension that he was to hand out certificates to his young charges.

He also received praise from the Rev. Duane Ramsey, pastor of the Washington City Church of the Brethren, Fourth street and North Carolina avenue S.E. With Pvt. Baucom was his wife, Blanche, who also was surprised.

He has been active in fostering youth ideals in Area N, of the Commissioners' Youth Council. He has organized teen-age youth programs in his area, even to the

Harvard Group Elects Ferris

The Harvard Business College Club of Washington last night elected George M. Ferris, Jr., president.

He succeeds Air Force Lt. Gen. Charles B. Stone III.

At the club's meeting in the Army-Navy Club, it also was announced that the Committee for Economic Development has given the club a \$25,000 research grant. The money will be used for a study of what factors will bring and keep business leaders in Washington for top Government jobs.

The club is made up of more than 600 Washington graduates of the Harvard Business School.

Senate Advances Bill On Water Research

The Senate yesterday passed a bill to authorize an additional \$10 million for research in developing fresh water from salt water.

The measure, introduced by Senator Case, Republican, of South Dakota, was substituted for similar legislation passed by the House. The differences remain to be adjusted.

Howard Pyle Leaves Hospital in Phoenix

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 27 (P).—Howard Pyle, administrative assistant to President Eisenhower, was released from the hospital today. He has been under treatment for a kidney ailment.

Mr. Pyle, former Governor of Arizona, will rest at his home in Tempe for a few days before returning to Washington.

FUNDS TO HONOR FRANKLIN VOTED; PROTEST IGNORED

PHILADELPHIA (P).—City Councilman Michael J. Towey has nothing personal against Benjamin Franklin. He assured fellow members in council yesterday he has a great deal of admiration for the famous Colonial patriot, statesman and inventor who spent much of his adult life making history in Philadelphia. After all, wasn't it Franklin with his kite and key who first discovered electricity?

There was the rub. Here was council considering a \$10,000 appropriation to help pay for the observance of Franklin's 250th birthday anniversary. Yet there are sections of the district which Mr. Towey represents that still are not wired to enjoy the benefits of Franklin's great discovery!

Irony or no, the council voted the appropriation.

Second Newspaper In Florida Closes

LAKE WORTH, Fla., May 27 (P).—The Lake Worth Leader yesterday suspended publication until further notice.

Silliman Evans, publisher, made the announcement to the staff. The newspaper was published five days a week excepting Monday and Saturday. Its final edition yesterday carried a two-column notice reading:

"Effective immediately, the Lake Worth Leader suspends publication until further notice." Mr. Evans has published the 30-year-old newspaper for two years. It was the second Florida newspaper to suspend publication in as many days. Yesterday the Capital Post, Florida's newest daily, published at Tallahassee, announced suspension. It had been published since March 20.
