Manhattan, Penn State Co-Favorites in IC-4A

NEW YORK, May 27 (AP).—Manhattan and Penn State ruled the co-favorites today as the 79th edition of the IC-4A track and field championships got underway with athletes from 47 colleges competing in the two-day carnival.

Trials were slated for today in 12 events with the finals of all 16 tests on the program tomorrow.

The big individual race, of course, will be the final of the half-mile, bringing together Arnie Sowell of Pitt and Tom Courtney of Fordham. Just a week ago, Courtney was declared the 880 winner in the Coliseum relays in Los Angeles only to have his medal taken away from him a half-hour later because the judges decided he had bumped Sowell off the track during the race.

Sowell Upset Courtney
Courtney's time was 1:50, the same as Sowell's clocking in the IC-4A 880 last year. It was in that race that the 130-pound Panther shot into prominence by edging Courtney, the heavy choice, who had been having a fine outdoor season.

Both Manhattan and Penn State could score in a dozen events and they meet head-on in the hurdles—Charley Pratt of Manhattan against Rod Perry and Bill Youkers—the shot, the discus and the mile relay.

A number of records could fall. Already the competitors have bettered five listed marks in earlier meets this month. The standards in the

100-yard dash, the 120-yard high hurdles, the javelin, hammer throw, pole vault and 440 all could fall.

John Haines of Penn has been caught in 9.5 for the 100, while Pratt has hit 13.9 in the hurdles. Charley Jenkins of Villanova, already has stepped the 440 distance in 46.5 in a relay this spring.

Kirk and Grim in Mile
Les Vieblig of Syracuse, with a best time of 4:12.4, is the mile favorite, while among his competitors are Ed Kirk of Georgetown, 4:12.9, and Burr Grim of Maryland, 4:13.1.

Georgetown also has Bob Lipemier and Frank Pfingst in the two-mile. John Peyton in the 880, Crosby Day in the 440, Tom Flaherty in the pole vault and Paul Barocelli in the shot and discus. Maryland has entered Mel Schwarz in the pole vault. Burke Wilson in the 440, Larry Faas in the mile and Tom Leas in the 440.

Frank Sevigne Heads IC-4A Coaches Group
NEW YORK, May 27 (Special).—Frank Sevigne of Georgetown University was elected president of the IC-4A Track Coaches Association last night, succeeding Louis C. Montgomery of Cornell.

Sevigne has been vice president the last four years. Others elected were Arthur O'Connor of Fordham, vice president; Douglas L. Raymond of Boston University, secretary, and Robert S. Grieve of Syracuse, treasurer.

Seixas Rallies To Beat Briton

PARIS, May 27 (AP).—Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, the United States champion, came from behind today to beat young Roger Becker of Britain in a rain-delayed third-round match of the French international tennis tournament. The score was 7-9, 6-4, 6-2, 6-3.

The 20-year-old Englishman was leading Seixas one set and the score was 5-4, in the American's favor, in the second yesterday when the match was halted.

When play resumed today, Seixas quickly took command. He won the 10th game to take the second set, then raced through the final two sets with the loss of only five games.

In another match, Sven Davidson of Sweden eliminated Francis Nys of France, 7-5, 6-1, 6-2.

Light rain began falling at noon, threatening to disrupt the fourth day's play in the tournament.

Ham Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., and Herb Flam of Beverly Hills, Calif., also won third-round matches. Richardson dropped the first two sets but bounced back to trim Gordon Forbes of South Africa, 4-6, 2-6, 6-2, 9-7, 6-2. Flam eliminated Sidney Schwartz of Brooklyn, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2.

America's chief hope in the women's division, Mrs. Beverly Baker Fleitz of Santa Monica, Calif., gained the third round with a 6-1, 6-2 victory over Josefa de Riba of Spain.

Blair High Threat In State Track Meet At College Park

The Maryland State scholastic track and field championships for class A, B and C schools will be held tomorrow at Byrd Stadium, College Park, starting with the field events at 10:30 a.m.

Montgomery Blair, winner of the Fort Hill Invitational meet at Cumberland last week, is expected to be a strong threat to take class A honors. Northwest, victor in the Prince Georges County championships last Wednesday, also will figure prominently. Towson High is expected to field a strong relay team and poses a threat while Fort Hill, defending champion, reportedly has another good team despite its loss to Blair last week.

Drivers at Indianapolis Wind Up Tests for '500'

INDIANAPOLIS, May 27 (AP).—Young Jerry Hoyt, who will be in fast company Monday at the front of the 500-mile auto race lineup, said today after test runs were completed, "I'll make no plans till the green flag drops."

Owners and drivers—mostly owners—were reluctant to send out their cars May 14 in the qualifying sessions that determine the pole car, inside spot on the front three-car row.

There were gusts of wind up to 36 miles an hour. Just before track closing time Hoyt rushed out of the pits in his Jim Robbins Special and earned the pole with a run of 140.045 miles an hour.

Bettenhausen in Front
Tony Bettenhausen, veteran driver from Tinley Park, Ill., was the only other driver to complete a qualifying run the first day and will start his Chapman race from the middle of the front row on his 139.985 performance.

Jack McGrath of Inglewood, Calif., went out the second day and set a track record of 142.580. He fills out the front row on the outside spot. He has grabbed the early lead in three of the last four Memorial Day races.

The second row includes Bill Vukovich of Fresno, Calif., who came from 19th place to win last year. He also finished first two years ago.

Final Runs Yesterday
He has heard the track gang guessing whether McGrath or Bettenhausen will lead at the end of the first lap—without conceding Jerry a chance to hold first place even once around the 2½-mile track.

A fourth-time starter, Hoyt, indicated he doesn't intend to be back in the pack at the end of the first lap.

Drivers made their final runs yesterday at unusually high speeds for fuel tests and chassis adjustments. McGrath and Art Cross of La Porte, Ind., starting in 24th place, were up to 138.5 miles an hour. Most of the others were checking their equipment almost as fast.

Joe Massaglia, owner of the Raleigh Hotel in Washington, has a four-cylinder Kurtis-Offenhauser entered in the Indianapolis auto classic. The car will be piloted by Andy Linden, veteran driver from Los Angeles.

\$17,000 Pace Features Card At Rosecroft

Queen's Filly Last As Favorite Wins 177th Epsom Oaks

EPSOM, England, May 27 (AP).—Meld, the 7-to-4 favorite, won the 177th renewal of the Epsom Oaks today as Queen Elizabeth saw her filly, Balladonna, finish last in a field of 13.

Ark Royal was six lengths back in second place and Reel was third in the mile-and-one-half race for 3-year-old fillies.

Meld, owned by Lady Zia Wernher, also won the One Thousand Guineas at Newmarket last month and today's victory was the third for a woman owner this season in Britain's classic races.

Mme. Suzy Volterra's Phil Drake won the Epsom Derby Wednesday.

Meld's winning time was 2:47½ and the victory was worth \$39,698 to the winning owner. Ark Royal's second money was \$4,670 and Reel took \$2,335 for third.

Both the winner and the Queen's last-place entry were trained by Capt. Cecil Boyd-Rochford at Newmarket. Harry Carr rode Meld, who is the 36th winner of the Thousand Guineas to follow up with an Oaks victory. Lady Wernher is the fourth woman to win the Oaks in 36 years.

NEW YORK, May 27 (AP).—A year ago Lulu Perez was sitting on top of the world, headed for a title shot and a series of big money matches. Tonight he finds himself fighting another local featherweight, Carmelo Costa, for the championship of Brooklyn, television money and little else.

If 22-year-old Perez whips Costa at Madison Square Garden, he will move up in the 126-pound class. But another bout with Sandy Saddler, the champion, who knocked him out in four rounds January 17 in a non-title scrap, packs little box office appeal.

Costa, only 21, might graduate into a championship contest in another six months or so but he's not ready yet.

Lulu's career took a turn for the worse when he was stopped by Percy Bassett last June in a bout that was to have provided a challenger for Saddler. Bassett later was beaten in another elimination match by Red Top Davis, who flunked his title test.

"The latest ratings show Costa No. 6 and Perez No. 7 among Saddler's contenders, going into tonight's 10-round match at 10 p.m. (Washington time). (The bout will be seen over WRC-TV.)
