Mr. Champion led the nine of clubs on the theory that a lead from his best suit, hearts, might give Mr. Abel his ninth trick. The queen of clubs in the closed hand won the first trick.

Mr. Abel elected to make a safety play in diamonds. He led a low diamond to dummy's ace and returned to his hand with the ace of spades. He remembered that the way to protect himself against any 4-1 break was to lead up toward the 10 on the second round.

So he led another small diamond. Mr. Champion played low, the 10 went on from dummy and Mrs. Keen won with the jack.

She made the obvious return of the nine of hearts. The best play from the closed hand here was the ace of hearts. This would leave another heart stopper in Mr. Abel's hand if it was Mr. Champion who held the king of diamonds.

But Mr. Abel put in the queen of hearts and it lost to the king. Back came the jack of hearts and Mr. Abel ducked. Another heart lead knocked out the ace, and since Mr. Champion had to get in once more with the king of diamonds there was now no way to make the contract.

"I was reading a book last night," wailed Mr. Abel, "and it recommended the very same play I used on the diamond suit to prevent the loss of more than two tricks."

"Sometimes the books don't tell the whole story," remarked Mr. Masters. "There's nothing wrong with your safety play as it applied to the one suit, diamonds."

"In this hand you couldn't afford the diamond safety play. As it happens, if you had simply led a diamond to the ace and returned a small one, you would have made four-odd."

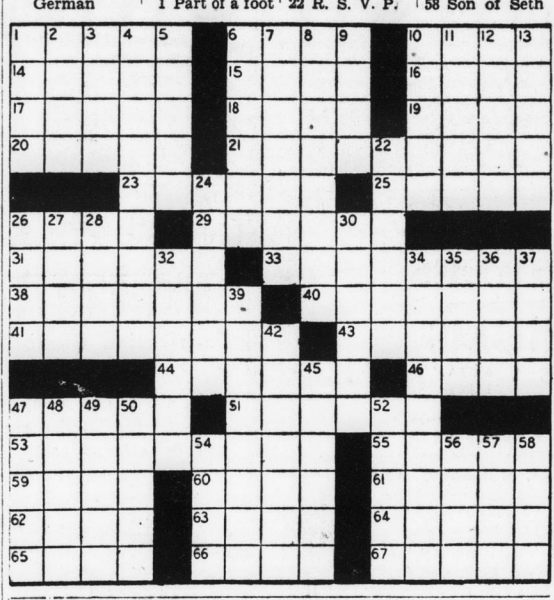

A WORD TO THE WISE

Some one (perhaps several some ones) in Hollywood and New York has been teaching young screen and TV players a lot of nonsense about the so-called broad A. The boys and girls are not only edifying our ordinary mortals with "ahsk, ahfter, chahce, dahnce," they also are using the broad A in words in which it is never used even in New England, the only part of the country where the broad or half-broad A occurs natively.

A starlet, during the "commercial" on a soap program, tells of "lothering" her face and then "sploshing" cold water on it. Another tells us of her new "brand" of "pot-a-cake" face powder.

Such pronunciations are supposed to be cultured. They are the exact opposite.

Many, but by no means all, New Englanders use the broad A natively in the so-called "ask"

words—ask, after, chance, dance, half, laugh, etc. Elsewhere in the country all such words are pronounced with the historically correct flat "a" as in "man."

But such words as lather, splash, brand, pat-a-cake, are never included in the "ask" group in New England or anywhere else, nor does any dictionary list such words with a broad or half-broad A.

Moreover, that the broad A in the "ask" words themselves is more cultured or correct than the flat "a" is a superstition, and nothing more, and is also a libel on cultured and educated people all over the Nation who never use the broad A in any of the words.

U. S. Officials Invited To MRA Musical

NAMES IN THE NEWS

The British Reuter's (ROYAL) News Agency reported that Czechoslovak President Antonin Zapotocky (AHN-toh-nin Zah-poh-TOH-tskee) has awarded the Order of the Republic to three Roman Catholic prelates, including Msgr. Antonin Eltschneider (ELT-shkner), Bishop of Prague, because of their "loyal" collaboration with the Communist regime.

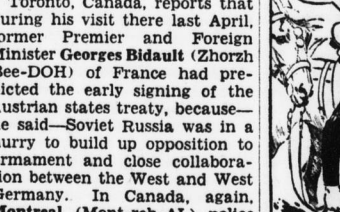
In Brazil, the on-and-off candidate for president, Gen. Juarez Tavora (Zhoo-ah-RES TAH-voh-rah), is on again after being off for two months. Because of his irresoluteness, political observers predict that his rival, Senhor Juscelino Kubitschek (Seh-NYOR Zhoo-seh-LIN-oh KOO-bee-tchek), is sure to win.

From Lima, Peru, come news that the Peruvian Congress has ratified an agreement concluded with Chile (CHEE) and Ecuador (Eh-quas-DOR) whereby the three countries fixed their maritime frontiers at 200 miles from their seacoasts. Even Soviet Russia does not claim more than 12 miles, where the United States and Britain are sticking to the traditional 3-mile limit.

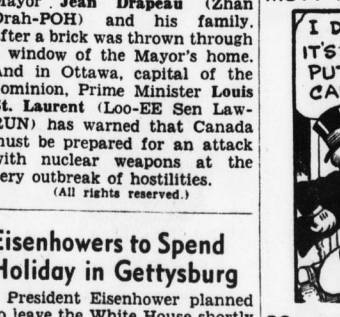
Toronto, Canada, reports that during his visit there last April, former Premier and Foreign Minister Georges Bidault (Zhorth Ego-POH) of France had predicted the early signing of the Austrian states treaty, because— he said—Soviet Russia was in a hurry to build up opposition to armament and close collaboration between the West and West Germany. In Canada, again, Montreal (Mont-reh-AL) police are keeping a close watch on Mayor Jean Drapeau (Zhan Drah-POH) and his family, after a brick was thrown through a window of the Mayor's home.

And in Ottawa, capital of the dominion, Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent (Loo-EE Sen Law-RUN) has warned that Canada must be prepared for an attack with nuclear weapons at the very outbreak of hostilities. (All rights reserved.)

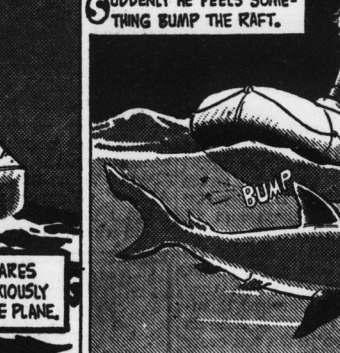

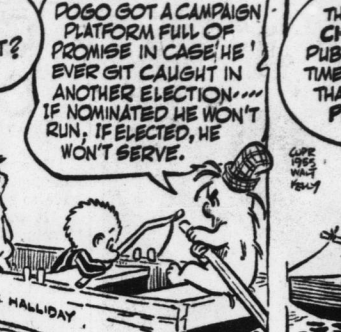

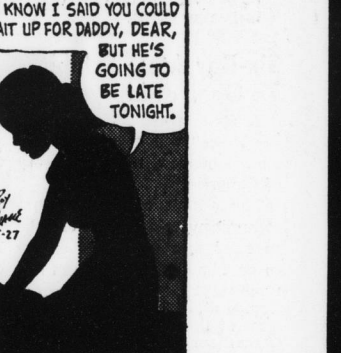
