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RABID DOG KILLED AFTER BITING HAND OF MRS. B. V. MORAN

Believed to have been suffering from rabies, a fox terrier which bit the right hand of Mrs. Elsie L. Moran, twenty-three years old, wife of Bernard V. Moran, 2330 Minnesota avenue southeast, was shot to death today by Policeman M. E. Thorne, of the Eleventh precinct. The dog worried Moran and his

family last night by barking and snapping at them while they were at supper. Running from the table in fear of the dog, Mrs. Moran was attacked, the animal biting her hand. Moran chased the dog into the yard. For several hours the animal ran about the yard, and Moran fired three shots at it, but missed.

The animal had been a family pet for several months, but when it continued aimlessly running around Moran summoned Policeman Thorne, who fired the fatal shot. The carcass of the dog today is at the pound. Health Department agents will examine the brain to ascertain whether the animal suffered from rabies. If so, Mrs. Moran will be urged to undergo Pasteur treatment to prevent hydrophobia.

FATHER CREEDON NOW HEADS GEORGETOWN U.

The Rev. John B. Creedon, S. J., for nine years the dean of the academic department, is today the new president of Georgetown University. He succeeds the Rev. Alphonsus J. Donlon, S. J., who is to become pastor of St. Mary's Church in Boston.

Since his first connection with the university Father Creedon has manifested the keenest interest in the conduct of college affairs. The new head of the university was born September 17, 1871, at Arlington, Mass. He received his education in the public schools and was later graduated from Boston College. He entered the Society of Jesus at the

novitiate at Frederick, Md., and took the higher branches of the Jesuit course of training at Woodstock College, Woodstock, Md. He completed his theological studies in Europe. Father Creedon began his work at Georgetown University in 1897.
