The Governmental hold has tightened about industry. Paving the way for a more complete industrial organization behind the armies, the "rationing" plan for the control of ndustries has been introduced.

Through self-financing, the control exercised over many industries by the curtailment of credit, has been lost temporarily, a Federal Reserve Board statement today revealed. The increasing'y large number of firms able to operate independently of banks therefore, has forced more drastic action by the Government, the statement says.
