

NEW RULES REDUCE RESTAURANT MENUS

A new food conservation program affecting all persons who eat in restaurants was announced today by the United States Food Administration.

There are twelve "general orders" in the new schedule, which provides for a reduction in the consumption of all foods, particularly staples, rather than a series of emergency regulations such as meatless and wheatless days and meals.

The New Rules. The order in brief, provided: Bread shall not be served which does not contain at least 20 per cent of wheat flour substitutes.

Sugar Bowls Banned. Use of the sugar bowl on table, or lunch counter, is forbidden. No public eating place may burn food, or permit food to be burned.

DISTRICT PAID 13 MILLION IN TAXES. New York paid \$889,378,000, of which \$688,268,000 was income and excess profits taxes.

Income and excess profits taxes in 1918 were 7.5 times greater than in 1917. A table of collections from these sources by States in the two years shows that West Virginia jumped from \$1,921,000 to \$48,840,000, an increase of nearly twenty-four times.

MUSEUM WILL BE USED AS HOSPITAL. CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—The Field Museum of Natural History in Grant Park, nearing completion at a cost of \$7,000,000, has been turned over to the Government for use as a hospital.

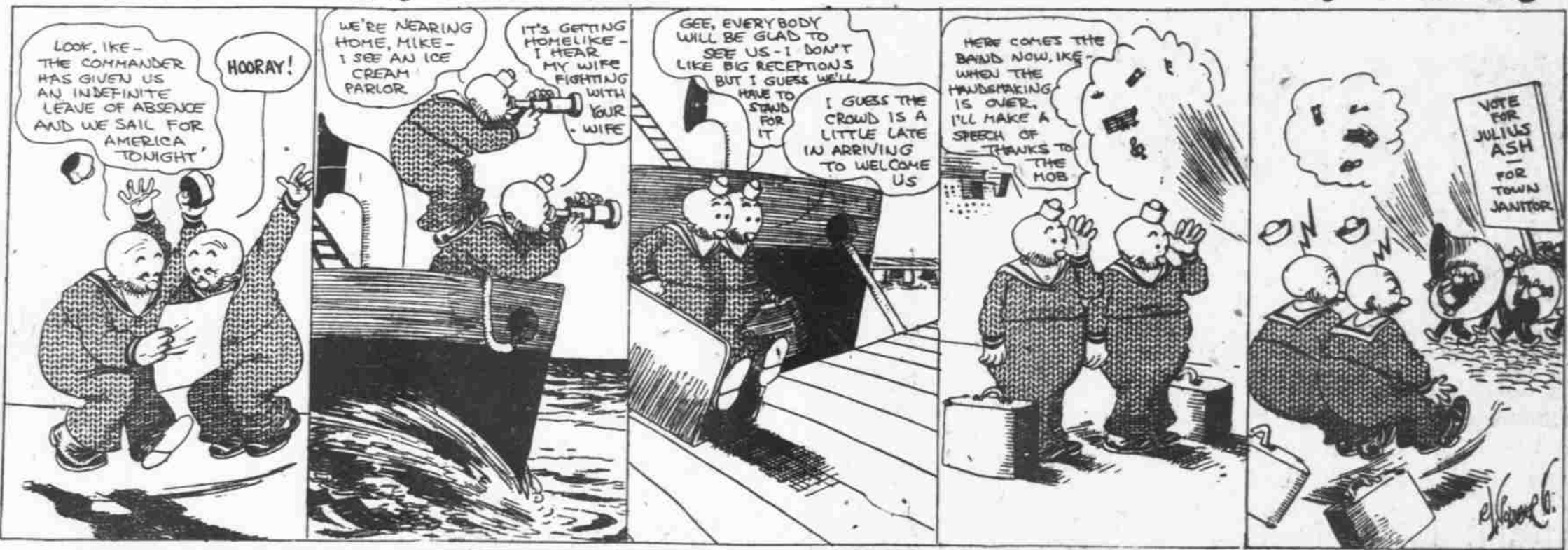

FEDERAL HOLD ON INDUSTRY TIGHTENS

The Governmental hold has tightened on industry, paving the way for a more complete industrial organization behind the armies, the "rationing" plan for the control of industries has been introduced.

Rationing Plan. Instead of attempting to control industry through the licensing of credit the Government now has moved to restrict expansion of so-called non-essentials at its source, it was explained. The priorities principle also is superseded and enlarged by the new plan.

Advices Banks. The Federal Reserve Board has advised banking interests that they should, in no wise, relax their scrutiny of applications for credit. Banking credit, it is pointed out, still is of basic importance.
