**Senor Pezet Made Ambassador of Peru—Belgian Envoy Returns**

FEDERICO ALFONZO PEZET, who sailed recently from New York for Peru, will return to this country next month as ambassador of Peru to the United States. His appointment to this important post has been made known by Senor Pezet's letters to friends in Washington. Senor de Pezet accompanied him on his journey to Peru and will return with him.

Senor Pezet was formerly Minister of Peru to the United States, but resigned from the diplomatic service when his government reduced the scope of its diplomatic establishment in Washington owing to financial difficulties. Since then Senor and Senora de Pezet have made their home in New York. The appointment is regarded by Washingtonians in general and the diplomatic corps in particular and a singularly happy one.

Baron de Cartier de Marchienne, Belgian Ambassador to the United States, has returned to the embassy at Washington after an extended absence in Europe. Baroness de Cartier will remain at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel, New York, for a few days, joining the Ambassador here on Monday.

**Jusserand Returns To D. C.**  
 The French Ambassador and Mme. Jusserand have returned to the embassy from New York.

The Italian battleship Conte di Cavour, which has been at Newport for a week or ten days, will come to Annapolis following its approaching visit to New York, and it is expected that Admiral Hugo Cozzani and the officers of the vessel will take this opportunity to visit Washington.

The ship will leave Newport for New York tomorrow and will be seven days at sea en route. Arrangements are now being made for the entertainment of Admiral Cozzani and his staff in New York, and a special gala performance of "Cavalleria Rusticana" and "Pagliacci" will be given in their honor at Madison Square Gardens on Sunday night, September 23. The proceeds will be for the Babies' Free Milk Fund of Italy.

Last night Admiral Cozzani and his staff were entertained at dinner by Mrs. William Miller Graham.

Senator and Mrs. Francis E. Warren will return to their apartment at 2029 Connecticut avenue tomorrow, having gone to New York to meet the Senator's son-in-law, General Pershing, on his arrival from Europe. Members of General Pershing's family will be guests of Senator and Mrs. Warren during their stay in Washington next week.

General Pershing and members of his staff, who will reach town this afternoon, will stay at the Shoreham, occupying the suite of rooms which President Wilson had at the time of his first inauguration.
