## Government Chest Unit Collects 58 Pct. of Goal

The Government unit of the Community Chest campaign was well over the halfway mark toward its big \$1,638,000 quota today.

The unit, which has a major responsibility in the overall campaign for \$4 million, reported yesterday it had contributions to date totaling \$962,988, or 58.8 per cent of its quota.

Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest, Treasurer of the United States, awarded several "oscars" for outstanding progress during the report meeting at the Washington Hotel. She, in turn, received a similar award on behalf of her office from Harvey Higley, Veterans' Administrator and chairman of the Government unit.

### Agencies Cited

Agencies cited for passing 100 per cent of their quotas included the Veterans Administration, through Denton H. Reed, with 114.5 per cent of quota; Library of Congress, Dr. Arch C. Gerlach, 112.3 per cent; Pan American Union, Harry Lawall, 104.4 per cent; Federal Civil Defense Administration, Lester J. Boykin, 108.8 per cent; National Capital Planning Commission, Sterling R. March, 100.6 per cent, and the General Services Administration, Robert G. Peebles, 100.3 per cent.

General Campaign Chairman E. K. Morris hailed the campaigns on their progress, and told them that success in the drive is measured not only in reaching quotas, but in obtaining every possible dollar. Dollars,

he pointed out, "do the real work."

### Fund Use Explained

Mrs. Priest displayed a \$1,000 bill to the gathering of some 500 Government agency keymen and told them of some of the Red Feather services it would buy:

Two hundred seventy days of care for youngsters in institutions; 370 nursing visits to someone ill at home; 75 weeks of care to persons in homes for the aged; 180 days of convalescent care for children; 20 months of foster home care for babies awaiting adoption; 100 weeks of day care for children of working mothers.

Mrs. Priest introduced 5-year-old Jane Hayes of 458 N street S.W., a visitor from Barney Neighborhood House, one of the day care centers, as a representative of the 250,000 area residents who received services last year from the more than 110 Red Feather agencies.

At the first over-all report meeting of the campaign last week, the volunteer workers reported \$1,078,878, or 26.97 per cent of the \$4 million goal in hand.

### Over-size Mattresses Made by 500 Firms

## Chest's Business Unit To Cite Fund Workers
