### MOVIE MANAGER FINED FOR "CRIME" PICTURES

Recent Alexandria Ordinance Is Tested in Court and B. B. Smith Loses.

### CASE WILL BE APPEALED

Alexandria, Va., April 16.—B. B. Smith, manager of the Alexandria Superior Amusement Company, was fined \$5 in the Police Court today for showing two alleged "crime" pictures, in violation of the ordinance passed recently by the City Council. The ordinance became effective yesterday and this, therefore, is the first case brought up under its provisions.

Mr. Smith noted an appeal from the court's decision, and will take the case to the Corporation Court. He has retained the services of Attorney Samuel G. Brent to represent him when the case is called before the higher court. Sgt. Scott was the complaining witness in the case.

According to his testimony, one of the pictures portrayed the battle of Shiloh, which was followed by a duel, in which one of the participants was supposed to have been killed. His testimony was substantiated by Sgt. Wilkinson, who

### was a spectator at the show. The second picture which came under the ban was entitled "God's Unfortunates."

Justice Caton, in summing up the case, declared that pictures along educational or historical lines showing violence will come under the ban in the "movies," but the law is intended in cases of plain killings where there is nothing to warrant such pictures.

Mr. Smith intimated that he would test the constitutionality of the law. Under the law, he said, he even would be unable to show such pictures as the Passion Play.

### CAIRO OUT OF DANGER.

Cairo, Ill., April 16.—All levees patrolmen and workers were withdrawn from the Cairo levees tonight as the river has fallen to fifty-one feet, and with a continued fall in sight the flood committee decided that Cairo was in no further danger from the waters. The soldiers on flood duty at Mound City have been sent home. The soldiers that have been on flood duty at Shawneetown were brought to Cairo this afternoon and left for their homes tonight.
