Interview of National Bank Officers with Secretary Boutwell.

CIRCUMSTANCES ATTENDING THE DISASTER.

The correspondent states that on the morning following the disaster, Tuesday, January 20th, he was summoned to the Onedia by a messenger who announced the accident to the Onedia. He says:

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### CRIME.

Charles Morrison, who was sentenced to thirty years imprisonment in the penitentiary for the murder of Mrs. W. C. H. Wilson, the Oxford Editor, was today sentenced to 35 years imprisonment, for committing suicide with intent to kill, on Marshall Gray, in Framingham Centre, and Dr. Henry Cowley, at Saxtonville, last October.

Leandro Plinkham, convicted of incendiarism, was sentenced to prison for life. In the trial of the case, the jury found that the defendant was guilty of the crime.

Brooklyn, March 10.-The trial of Chambers for murder has been postponed till April on an affidavit stating the belief that Chambers had fled to Ireland, and that it is necessary to obtain the evidence of important witnesses in Ireland.
