NEW YORK AHEAD BANKING LAWS

So Glynn Declares After Signing Van Tuyl Commission Bill.

Albany, April 16.—"In my opinion New York now has the best banking law of any state in the Union," said Governor Glynn today in announcing the signing of the Van Tuyl commission bill. It radically revises the banking laws, and for the first time places private bankers under the jurisdiction of the Superintendent of Banks.

PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS ARE SUPERINTENDED

Governor Also Approves Measure to Suppress Fraudulent Realty Companies.

The Governor said that although there were provisions in the new law permitting the formation of a land bank they were not as broad as those contained in his land bank bill, which failed of passage. He announced his intention of signing the companion bill designed to provide for the formation of co-operative credit unions, although that feature also was taken care of in part in the Van Tuyl bill.

Mayor to End Big Condemnation Fees

Announces After Hearing He Will Sign Bill Abolishing Commissioners.

Mayor Mitchell announced last night that he would sign the bill abolishing condemnation commissioners and permitting the city to condemn property in excess of its actual needs, which could later be resold at a profit, unless legal obstacles prevented. At the hearing on the bill yesterday lawyers who have grown rich as condemnation commissioners alone appeared in opposition to the measure.
