Chicago, Sept. 30.—Unable to walk because of an attack of neuritis, A. A. Stagg, director of athletics of the University of Chicago, prepared to-day to assume active charge of the football team, which he had been perched on the seat of a motorcycle.

The veteran coach, who has been confined to his home for ten days, made his first appearance this year at the football field yesterday, following his charge around the field on a motorcycle. This season is the first in twenty-two years that Stagg has failed to be on the field at the beginning of the practice work.

Stagg asserted that his condition was showing improvement and that he hoped to be "on his feet" within three or four days.

MUCH JOY FOR JIM RICE

One of the largest squads that has ever reported for fall rowing was turned out by the freshman class at Columbia yesterday, to the great delight of Jim Rice, the coach.

The first squad of the afternoon showed a total of thirty-five candidates and the two succeeding squads had fully as many, so that in all nearly one hundred members of the entering class registered for the crew and spent half an hour on the machine in the first practice.

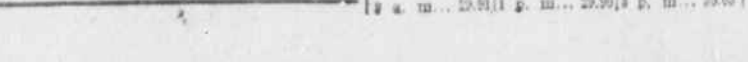
