"Nothing in this bill will prohibit the practice of legitimate medicine. In fact we are trusting the doctors and allow ing the drug to be sold on their order. But we are going to see to it that get ting the drug will be made difficult enough to prevent criminal traffic in it The penalties are not as severe as I would like them. In the first draft of the bill I proposed that a term of five years in prison be given to all caught selling the drugs illegally and that this sentence should be compulsory on the judges, allowing no loophole for the onvicted. This has been changed to imprisonment from two to lifteen years which may work-out better than the other, because there are lots of traders for whom fifteen years is little enough." It is the general opinion here that the Senate will pass the bill without a struggle

Coulter, of No. 2 Rector street, attorney for Mrs. Vanderbilt, to watch the fight for the bill and be ready to supply statistics to Senators who are in doubt as to the evils wrought by morphine and heroin

I have a son, twenty years old, who became addicted to the habit ten months ago When he started he was a bright young man with a good education. In a few months he became a nervous wreck We sent him to a sanatorium in Conpecticul for two months, but after he came home he started using drugs again, and we had to send him to

"The last and saddest means of saving him was to have him arrested and kept in the Tombs for two months, This did no good, for even in the Tombs he managed to get the drugs. As a heartbroken mother I appeal to you. Is there anything you could advise me to do for him? Is there any place I can send him where he will be cured? "I fear if something is not done for


