

USE NEW SERUM TO FIGHT PLAGUE; MANY GIVE BLOOD

Physicians Get Favorable Results with Cure from Normal Adults' Veins.

TREATMENT IS USED ON STRICKEN DOCTOR

New Cases Number 167, Increase of 2-42 Deaths, Increase of 11.

The infantile paralysis epidemic showed another light increase in the greater city yesterday, two more new cases and eleven more deaths being reported than on Friday.

Human blood drawn from the veins of adults who have never had infantile paralysis has been added to the various agencies with which physicians of the Department of Health are experimenting in the hope of developing a cure or preventive for the scourge.

New Serum Believed Effective.

One case in particular was cited by the health authorities, wherein a child, brought to the hospital in a stupor in which she lay for seven days, was treated with the normal blood serum.

Dr. Zingher and his assistants have now treated seventy children with the immune serum, and excellent results have been observed in more than half of the cases.
