

Plans for Registration of 10,000,000 Men To-day

625,000 Will Be Drafted for First Army

Washington, June 4.—Plans of the War Department to draft from 900,000 to 1,500,000 men of the 10,000,000 who it is estimated will register tomorrow for the new army were disclosed to-day by Provost Marshal General Crowder to the Senate Military Affairs Committee.

General Crowder told the committee the additional 125,000 will be needed to fill up vacancies in the army of 500,000 and to keep training camps in continuous operation.

General Crowder told the committee he favored immediate drafting of men registering rather than postponement of the draft for several weeks after registration.

Details of making exemptions also were explained to the committee by the Provost Marshal General. He said the government does not contemplate any class exemptions, but that all will be personal.

The men drafted probably will be in training camps by September 1, General Crowder said, and added that he favored beginning selection within two weeks after registration.

14,000 Policemen Are Mobilized to Aid Registration

Department Ready for Any Demonstration Against Draft System

At 1 o'clock this morning, New York's Police Department of approximately 14,000 men, was mobilized for its part in the work of registration.

Each registration booth will be guarded by three uniformed men—two regular policemen and a Home Defence League.

At Police Headquarters in Manhattan and in Brooklyn about 400 of the men who were trained last summer at the Fort Wadsworth police military camp are mobilized.

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Barnard Girl, Facing Jail, Gives Promise to Quit Anti-Draft Fight

Only When Her Bail Is Revoked and Cell Looms Before Her Does Miss Parker Yield to Pleading of Mother and Lawyer's Advice

For nearly two hours late yesterday afternoon Federal officials vainly sought to break down the stoical, determined resistance of Miss Eleanor Wilson Parker, Columbia University anti-draft agitator, and induce her to give her word to make no further attempts to encourage violation and evasion of the conscription law.

Facing the cancellation of her bail, which had been fixed at \$1,500, following her indictment by a Federal grand jury, unless she recanted and pledged herself to agitate no further, Miss Parker stubbornly refused.

The girl was taken into the office of United States Marshal Thomas D. McCarthy, where she was closeted with the marshal, her mother and A. B. Samuels, an attorney retained by Mr. Russell.

Miss Parker's mother, Mrs. J. McKee Cattell, of Columbia University, advised her to do so. Russell had earlier in the afternoon appeared as counsel for Professor Cattell's son, Owen Cattell, and Charles Francis Phillips, Columbia students, who had been indicted with Miss Parker on a charge of conspiracy.

Professor Cattell ushered out Russell and Professor Cattell were summoned to Marshal McCarthy's office, but both upheld Miss Parker in her refusal to recant, go with her mother to her home in Asbury Park, N. J., and promise to remain there until called to face trial.

Miss Parker, and she was released. Miss Parker had planned, it was said, to institute mandamus proceedings against Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia, to compel him to give her her diploma, but her promises included the abandonment of this idea.

Four others were indicted yesterday afternoon by the same grand jury that returned indictments against the Columbia students. The other alleged anti-draft plotters were Louis Kramer, Morris Becker, Joseph Walker and Louis Sternburg. They also were arraigned before Judge Mayer.

The mood of the courts with regard to such cases was plainly indicated by the heavy bail fixed by Judge Mayer after the seven had pleaded not guilty to charges of conspiracy.

Mr. Samuels appeared on behalf of Miss Parker's mother, to make a special plea for leniency on her behalf. Cattell and Phillips were represented by Winter Russell, who told the court Morris Hilgitt would later appear as counsel for all three. Judge Mayer held the two youths in \$5,000 bail each.

Mr. Samuels told the court that Miss Parker had no right to choose her own counsel, being a minor, and at her mother's instructions he would remain a her representative, irrespective of what other counsel entered the case or any objections Miss Parker might make.

Judge Mayer fixed 1 p. m. to-morrow as the hour for arguing a demurrer by counsel for Kramer, Becker, Walker and Sternburg. If demurrers are overruled they will go to trial at 10:30 a. m. Monday, June 11. The trial of the three Columbia students will follow immediately after that of the four other alleged conspirators.

Students Out on Bail

Harry Phillips, father of Francis Phillips, furnished cash bail for him, and Professor Cattell bailed out his son.

The indictments against the Columbia students alleged they wrote and prepared to print a pamphlet urging eligible men not to register. The pamphlets were never distributed. The four other men are charged with distributing anti-draft literature at a recent meeting at Madison Square Garden.

It will be a valuable aid to the Federal registration. Any discrepancies in the two enrolments will be immediately looked into.

It is expected that arrests of persons for failing to register will continue at intervals for months to come. It is believed that many employers will hereafter require registration of birth certificates from young men before giving them jobs.

"Keep Certificates Handy"

It is also possible the police may at any time demand birth or registration certificates from persons who appear eligible, and all men who register are advised to "keep their certificates constantly handy."

Various means will be adopted to ferret out those who fail to comply with the law. Agents of the Department of Justice have already compiled lists of suspects who, they believe, will not register.

Voting Lists To Be Used

The first step after the registration is completed at 9 o'clock to-night will be to compare these lists with the registration returns. As soon as discrepancies develop arrests will be ordered.

When the rounding up of those on the list of suspects is completed, which probably will not be for several days, other means of detection will be adopted. The voting lists of the last election will be compared with the registration records. Comparison also will be made with lists of eligibles which Secret Service operatives have compiled during the last few weeks, after taking secret censuses of rooming houses, tenements and other places in congested districts where anti-draft sentiments have been freely expressed.

This is a copy of an official "registration primer" prepared by the War Department:

Who Must Register

All male persons (citizens or aliens) born between the sixth day of June, 1886, and the fifth day of June, 1896, both dates inclusive, except Members of any duly organized force, military or naval, subject to be called, ordered or drafted into military or naval service of the United States, including all officers and enlisted men of the regular army, regular army reserve, Officers' Reserve Corps, Enlisted Men's Reserve Corps, National Guard and National Guard Reserve, recognized by militia bureau; the navy, the Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Naval Militia, Naval Reserve force, Marine Corps Reserve and National Naval Volunteers, recognized by the Navy Department.
