POLICE READY TO MEET STRIKE

Maj. Pullman Gives Emergency Orders Following Crisis in Car Trouble.

STOPS ABSENCE LEAVE

Policemen Will Be Stationed Along Street Railway Lines Where Riots Might Occur.

An order mobilizing the police force of Washington, coincident with a crisis in the relations between street car employees and employers, was issued yesterday by Maj. Pullman, superintendent of police.

The order announced that absence permits would not be issued to applicants if it was understood they were to leave the city and called upon the police to hold themselves "ready to report for duty upon notice to do so."

It is understood a plan is being worked out whereby each of the 715 policemen in the District is to be assigned to special duty and ordered to slip into the new routine at the emergency command.

While many policemen will be assigned to guard the fifteen car barns of the two railway companies and nearly an equal number of sub-stations, work shops and other buildings, the majority will be held in readiness to take beats where riots would be likely to occur along the lines of the companies.

In discussing the instructions from the office of the superintendent of police, an official declared the two street railway companies had not been in communication with the police department and that the order was not in anticipation of a strike.
