A NEW PATENT.

Hon. C. M. Brown has invented and patented a new process for wrapping fruits, especially oranges. The wrapper is made from a round piece of paper of a stiffer texture than the tissue paper formerly used. This round piece is crimped into a cup shape without having any seams or breaks.

It will expand to let the fruit in and close together over it afterwards.

This patent has several good features.

It gives the fruit plenty of ventilation and saves the price of expert wrappers who are paid \$2 per day for their services, as any child can pack the fruit in these cups, as Mr. Brown calls them.

Another advantage is that the tops of the oranges are visible without disturbing the whole crate to see the quality and condition of the fruit.

The patent is bound to prove a financial success to the inventor.

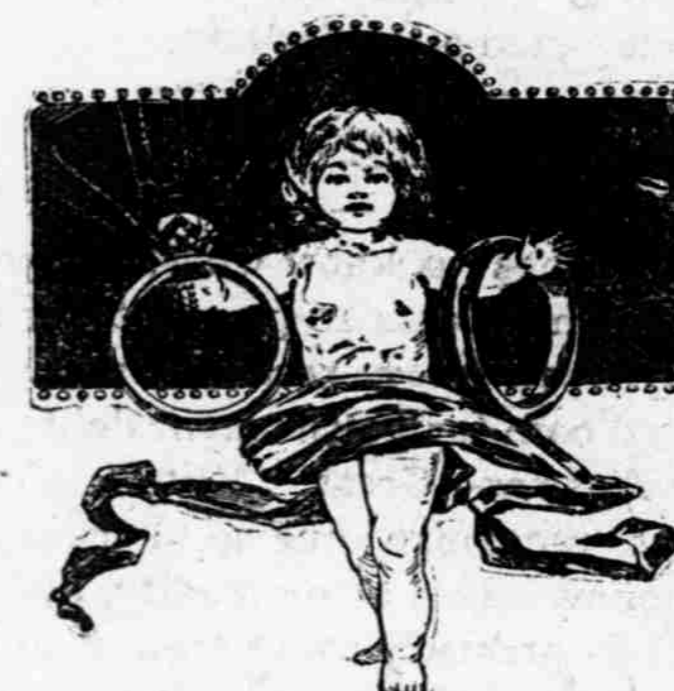
