VULTURES HOVER

OVER SPAIN'S RUINED FORTS AT SANTIAGO BAY

Showing That The American Fire Was Destructive To Life As Well As To Property

SHAFTER'S MEN HAVE ARRIVED

And The Haughty Dons Will Now Find Out How The Yankees Can Fight On Land

THEY HAVE ARRIVED

Mole, St. Nicholas, June 20.—Shafter's fleet has arrived off Santiago and Guantanamo. The landing of troops is probably being accomplished. The marines at Guantanamo Bay have been reinforced. There will be no concerted move on the city until the latter part of the week.

BLANCO IS OBEDIENT

Key West, June 20.—Dispatches have been received to the effect that Blanco refuses to exchange Hobson and his crew. He says the Americans must capture Havana before he will release them.

HUNGRY HAVANA

Key West, June 20.—A Cuban officer of Rodriguez's staff arrived from Havana, states that there are 50,000 Spaniards there and the city is well fortified. The people suffer greatly for food. A majority of the troops have been removed to the coast for protection against the Americans.

Key West, June 20.—The Spanish army in Havana is on half rations. Work on the defenses of Havana continue. Two lines of torpedoes have been extended across the mouth of the harbor. The only war vessels in the harbor are small gun boats and the Alfonso XII.

A SUSPICIOUS INCIDENT

Jamaica, June 20.—The Spanish flag at Morro castle was half masted for several hours after the bombardment by the Vesuvius, Thursday. Its significance is not known. It is thought by some to mean the death of Hobson and his crew. Sampson believes it was in honor of General Fijera, killed in the bombardment.

THE THIRD MANILA

San Francisco, June 20.—The Astor battery has arrived. It is reported that several steamships have been impressed by the government for the third expedition.

FIRE AND RUN

Mole, St. Nicholas, June 20.—It is reported that the Spaniards intend to burn Caminera and retreat. The marines at Fisher's Point expect an attack soon.

SPY OR CARELESSNESS

Cincinnati, June 20.—The smokeless powder finishing house at King's mills was completely

destroyed by an explosion last night. A stranger, who is supposed to have applied the fuse, is believed to be a Spanish spy. No one was hurt.

AT THE CAPITAL

Washington, June 20.—Officials of the war department are of the opinion that the Porto Rican expedition will start July 1. Active preparations are being made under the direct supervision of General Miles. Orders have been issued to the chiefs of the various bureaus to rush supplies with all possible speed to Fernandina. Fifteen regiments, now at Camp Thomas, have received orders to prepare to move to Fernandina.

Cadets Heard of the Massachusetts, and Powell of the New York have been officially commended for bravery by Sampson. Today's yellow fever situation continues favorable. No new cases at McHenry.

It is now definitely determined to send General Garretson, now in command at Camp Alger, to reinforce Shafter, with troops on the Harvard and Yale.

The third call for volunteers will not be made immediately. Captain Corbin says the third call is not in prospect. He admits the possibility of a new call under certain circumstances, which may develop in a few days.

Commodore Watson wipes from Key West: "Blanco states that the Spanish government refuses to exchange the Merrimac crew." The Senate resolution on the annexation of Hawaii is under discussion today. Senator Morrill is making a speech against it.

THE PHILIPPINE REPUBLIC

Manila, June 20.—A provisional government was proclaimed in Old Cavite June 12, and a declaration of independence, renouncing Spanish authority, was read. The insurgents do not oppose an American protectorate or occupation. The Rebels captured the Spanish governor and garrison containing 500 men.

QUIET AT MANILA

Manila, June 17, via Hong Kong.—The situation is unchanged. The insurgents are unable to take Manila, owing to lack of field guns. They could not take it if Dewey permitted, which he will not. The report that the United States transports had arrived from San Francisco is incorrect. They are expected on the 20th. All foreigners are leaving on neutral ships.

MORE MEN FOR MANILA

Chicago, June 20.—Colonel Wilard Young started for San Francisco today to organize the third battalion of a regiment of engineers, which will be part of the next Philippine expedition. The other two battalions will be formed at Fort Sheridan by Richard Henry Savage, the novelist, who is a former army engineer, and Major Pinckard of Alabama.

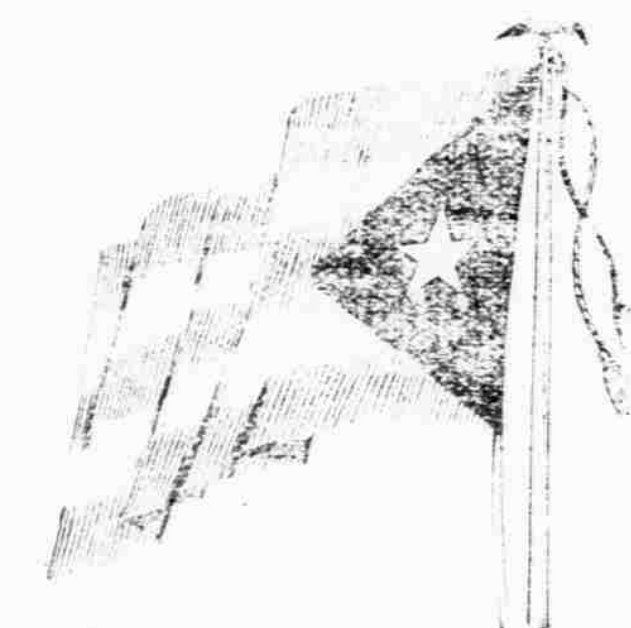
