SPANISH COURAGE

SEEMS TO BE RAPIDLY EVAPORATING

Newspapers That Were Shouting For War A Few Weeks Ago Are Now Howling For Peace

WE HAVE JUST BEGUN TO FIGHT

It Was Hard to Make the Yankee Nation Fighting Mad and It Will Not be Easy to Put It In A Good Humor Again

A SPANISH PLOT

St. Thomas, June 22.—Consul Hanna has discovered a plot of the Spanish governor, Masias, of Porto Rico, to embroil the United States in a quarrel with other powers. He had mounted four cannon on the heights between Santuree, a suburb of San Juan, and the sea to attract the American fire. The suburbs occupied exclusively by prominent foreigners, including fourteen consuls. Masias' plan was to cause a wholesale slaughter during the bombardment, causing foreign complications. The authorities have been notified.

WANTS TO BREAK HIS BOTTLE

Santiago, June 22.—Cubans report to Sampson that it is well understood in the city that Cervera means to attempt to run through the channel and evade the American fleet at the first favorable opportunity. His ships are kept coated to their utmost capacity and lookouts are stationed to watch for an opening. Cervera is getting desperate and is willing to take any chance.

PANDO NEEDS PUNISHMENT

Oil Santiago, June 22.—Admiral Sampson has been notified that General Pando is marching with a large force from Holguin to reinforce the Spaniards at Santiago. It is said the insurgents are placed so as to cut off his approach, but it is probable that Pando will fight his way through.

CUBANS TO CUBA

Tampa, June 22.—The Florida sailed from Port Tampa yesterday morning on her second expedition to Cuba. The steamer carried 400 volunteers, well armed and equipped; 15,000 rifles, 1,500,000 rounds of ammunition and 200 tons of supplies. The munitions and supplies were for the Cuban army. It is believed that she will land at Porto de Bines. The Cubans were accompanied by two detachments of the 10th United States cavalry.

THE THIRD MANILA

San Francisco, June 22.—The third Philippine expedition starts Monday. General Merritt will leave on the gunboat Newport on Wednesday following, and will probably be accompanied by the 7th California regiment. Several hundred recruits arrived this morning.

LEAVING THE SINKING SHIP

Kingston, June 22.—The Adula arrived today with nearly a hundred passengers, all Spanish;

among them being Charez, secretary to Blanco, who is on his way to Spain on a secret mission. He is booked under an assumed name.

AT THE CAPITAL

Washington, June 22.—The president is busy receiving a large number of callers. He officially stated at 1 p. m. that he had received no important communication, but it is believed that a communication from Shafter of a private nature was received last night.

Through the persistent efforts of the Florida delegation in Congress the state is to have a namesake in the new navy. The name Florida is to be given to one of the coast defense monitors, authorized by the new naval bill.

CUBA'S NAVY

New York, June 22.—The Cuban yacht Alfredo started for Cuba this morning.

MOVING TROOPS

Providence, June 22.—The Rhode Island volunteers, under the second call, start for Falls Church, Va., today.

New York, June 22.—Over 200 recruits for the 8th regiment left for Chickamauga this morning.

Jersey City, June 22.—Battery H of the 7th and Battery D of the 5th heavy artillery, departed this morning for Tampa.

BAD LUCK TO THE BUFFALO

Newport News, June 22.—Preparations for arming the cruiser Buffalo have been stopped. It is believed she has been rejected.

SHAFTER'S REINFORCEMENT

Washington, June 22.—Dofield's first brigade left this morning for Hampton Roads, there to embark on the Harvard and Yale and join Shafter.

RAN THE BLOCKADE

Kingston, June 22.—The Spanish steamer Purisima Concepcion, laden with food supplies and \$100,000 in gold, is reported to have eluded the American ships and arrived at Trinidad.

MUST HAVE SHOT THEMSELVES

Key West, June 22.—A warship just arrived reports a quiet blockade. She brought in two wounded gunners.

Result of Teachers' Examination

The grading committee have finished examining the papers of the applicants for teachers' certificates at the examination held June 7.

The committee consisted of Professor P. Wilson Green of McIntosh, Miss Miriam Pasteur of Ocala, and Miss Donnella Griffin of Anthony.

WHITE TEACHERS

Eight applied for first grade certificates and only two reached the goal. Seven passed for second grade and twenty-four for third grade. Sixteen failed. Of the eight that stood for first grade certificates, six received third grade.

COLORED TEACHERS

Of those examined none received first or second grade certificates. Only nine passed for third grade, and thirty-five failed.

The grading committee closed its labors Monday noon. In the late examination teachers had to supply their own stationery. Superintendent Caro says it worked like a charm. There was no indiscriminate waste of it, as when the county supplied it. The amount used cost about \$25.

There will be another examination in September, and all who fall below Demosthenes and Cicero can point their Fabers and try again.
