Bryan, of Pensacola, Florida, to Mr. John Joseph Duncan, of Dayton, Ohio, was impressively solemnized at the home of the bride's uncle, Mr. E. N. Bryan, 614 West Fifth street, in the presence of some seventy-five guests.

The home was filled with a profusion of white and pink chrysanthemums arranged in baskets. Southern smilax, with white and pink roses, holly and orange leaves, which came from Florida, draped the windows, chandelier and mantel. At one end of the living-room an altar was arranged of palms and baskets of chrysanthemums tied with white tulle. The soft light of many tapers furnished the only illumination during the ceremony.

A beautiful musical program was rendered by Misses Flora and Lillian Graf, two of Dayton's most talented musicians. As they played softly Lo-

hengrin's Wedding March, the bride and groom took their places before the officiating clergyman. Rev. Mr. Moser, pastor of the Trinity English Lutheran church, who read the single ring service.

North Atlantic Seaboard Swept By Snow Storm

Washington, Dec. 14.—The storm, which in the last twenty-four hours brought to the North Atlantic Seaboard and the Great Lakes region the first heavy snow of the season was central off Sandy Hook, New Jersey, moving northeastward tonight.

The weather bureau forecasters predicted more snow tomorrow in New York, New England, Pennsylvania and New Jersey and warnings were displayed to shipping. Five inches of snow fell in Philadelphia. The wind is blowing sixty-four miles an hour in New York.
