**WATER FRONT NOTES.**  
**The Gracia Leaves.**  
With a large and valuable miscellaneous cargo, the Spanish steamship Gracia left port yesterday, enroute to Liverpool. This steamer was loaded to her capacity inside of one week, which is another record hung up by the forces on the L. & N. terminals.

**Large Fleet at Anchor.**  
Quite a fleet is at anchor in the stream today, but as fast as possible berths will be assigned, and ballast discharged. All vessels which had been detained for the past two days came over to the anchorage during the day, adding much to the appearance of the bay. These vessels were the Russian bark Tjerimal, Italian bark San Antonio, Russian schooner Uranus and the Italian brig Louisa, which sailed over. The American schooner Anna D. Heidritter which was towed into port Saturday, Sunday was anchored in the stream, and taken in connection with the large

## TWO CLAIMING GOVERNORSHIP

Republican and Democratic Candidates in Arizona Want Office.

Phoenix, Ariz. Jan. 1.—Thomas E. Campbell, republican, was inaugurated governor of Arizona today. There were no inaugural ceremonies for Governor G. W. P. Hunt, incumbent, who claims the office, but when Governor Campbell went to the executive offices he found them locked.

Governor Campbell delivered his inaugural address to a great crowd that filled the capitol grounds. There was no serious disturbances. Scores of armed deputies were scattered throughout the assemblage.

Immediately after his address, Governor Campbell proceeded to the executive offices. He found a deputy on guard there who said because it was a legal holiday he was under instructions to admit no one. A formal demand for admittance was made and the governor withdrew.

Governor Hunt left the capitol shortly before Governor Campbell arrived, declaring he would be at his desk tomorrow. Governor Campbell announced the oath of office he took Saturday before a notary public sufficient to entitle him to the governorship. Therefore he had not insisted on a formal ceremony at the capitol today.

Mandamus proceedings already have been commenced in the supreme court to compel Governor Hunt to relinquish the office of chief executive.

### MEMBERS OF CREW OF URANN ARRIVE

Newport News, Va., Jan. 1.—The American steamer Oneago brought into Hampton Roads this morning three survivors of the crew of the American schooner Marcus L. Urann, which was wrecked off St. Michaels during a hurricane on November 29. The three men were taken to the navy hospital at Norfolk for treatment.

According to the survivors' stories, the Urann, owned by a Boston firm, was bound from Pensacola to France when it ran into the storm which sent her to destruction. The captain, his wife, and eight members of the crew were lost. The three survivors climbed upon the stern of an up-

All three of the men were seriously ill as the result of their experience, but it is thought they will recover within a short time.
