## U. S. GRAND JURY REPORTS 17 INDICTMENTS

INQUISITORIAL BODY WILL PROBABLY FINISH DELIBERATIONS AND BE RECESSED TODAY, SUBJECT TO RECALL.

The grand jury in the U. S. district court, working in conjunction with Attorney Neeley, after having been in continuous session since the convening of court Monday morning by Judge Wm. B. Sheppard, made its first report yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, showing a total of 17 indictments found to that time. The body continued its investigations until 1 o'clock when recess was taken until 10 o'clock this morning. The body will perhaps complete its deliberations during the day and will be recessed subject to recall of the court. It is understood that none of the indictments so far found are of a sensational character. Following disposition of three or four cases on the trial docket of the court with reference to which Assistant Attorney Hoffman is conducting the prosecutions, recess was taken at noon until 10 o'clock this morning. It is thought probable that the business of the term will be completed today or tomorrow.

Charley Baker and Arthur Barnes, who pleaded guilty Tuesday to violating the postal laws, were each sentenced to a term of nine months in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, during the morning session of the court yesterday. The case of Joe Eastman was continued. The three negroes were alleged to have been "engaged in the postoffice business in competition with Uncle Sam," at an isolated point on the Marianna and Blountstown railroad.

Clara Barbee pleaded guilty to violating the federal zone act, but sentence has not yet been passed by Judge Sheppard in her case.

## CARL ASHUKIAN PLEADS GUILTY GETS 4 YEARS

ARMENIAN WAS CHARGED WITH HAVING BURGLARIZED THE STORE OF RAY HARDWARE COMPANY.

Carl Ashukian, Armenian, who was arrested about a week ago on the charge of having burglarized the store of Ray Hardware company, on lower Palafox street, one night last week, after he is alleged to have secreted himself in a closet in the store where he remained until everybody had left the building, went before Judge C. Moreno Jones, of the county court of record, yesterday and entered a plea of guilty on two counts, that of grand larceny and breaking. He was sentenced to a term of two years at the state prison farm on each count, making a total of four years.

The merchandise, including tools, auto tires, paints, etc., found in possession of the man when he was apprehended as he was about to get away from the store with his auto truck load, was recovered.

A letter received by The Journal from the defendant since he was incarcerated, evidences a pitiable spirit of Bolshevism, characteristic of the breeding of oppression, such as that of the plight of the Armenians under Turk rule.

The writer, in his broken English, tells of his departure from the south European country of his nativity, five years ago, to save himself being drafted into the service of the Turkish army under the government which he "hates."

He relates his escape to America and the numerous hardships experienced in an endeavor, under extreme difficulties, to accumulate sufficient funds with which to secure transportation for his mother and sisters to this country and sets forth, among other things, that he was "cheated" out of money earned by the clearing of lands. He says he cleared about 100 acres of lands near Pensacola for himself and others.

The young Armenian had lived for some time near Olive, in this county and is understood to be in possession of a small farm there.
