**TWO SUMMER SCHOOLS WILL BE HELD HERE**

ONE SCHOOL TO BE FOR BENEFIT OF TEACHERS AND OTHER FOR PUPILS DESIRING TO FINISH CERTAIN WORK.

Two special summer schools will open session in Pensacola at the close of the school year the last of May, according to County Superintendent A. S. Edwards. One, to be conducted by Prof. Stapleton, of the state department of education, will be for the benefit of teachers and prospective teachers and will run till June 29. The other will be for the benefit of pupils who wish to make up delinquent work or to do special work and receive regular credits for it.

This school will be in charge of Prof. Collier, and the nominal fee of ten dollars will be charged. It is stated that neither of the professors in charge of the summer schools are to benefit from the tuition fees, as these men are on regular salary, and the fees will be used to pay the four ladies who were recommended by Prof. Collier to the board as the teaching force and formally chosen by the board.

Supt. Edwards also stated that the architect has been asked to submit bids for the new high school building on three different bases:

1. With the interior of the auditorium and gymnasium incomplete or unfinished.
2. With the auditorium, gymnasium and five class rooms unfinished.
3. Without auditorium or gymnasium.

**U. C. V. REPORT FINE TRIP TO STATE REUNION**

CAMP WARD REPRESENTATIVES EMBRACED COMRADES STRICKLAND, RIGBY, BRADLEY AND RAWLS.

Camp Ward, United Confederate Veterans, was represented by Comrades Strickland, Rigby, Bradley and Rawls at the convention held in Jacksonville last week. They have returned to the city and express themselves as having been delighted with their trip and the reunion. They assert the meeting was full of interest to those present, as well as for all the surviving veterans, and the widows of veterans throughout Florida.

Resolutions were passed asking the legislature to grant an increase in the monthly allowance up to \$30 per month. Another resolution commissions the Delegation of Sons of Veterans, now in St. Louis, to represent the Florida Division, U. C. V., and to ask that they be incorporated in the American Legion, now being formed in that city.

In electing officers for the ensuing year, the division named General N. A. Blitch of Tallahassee, commander. General Blitch has been faithfully supporting the work of the division for many years, is popular throughout the state, and will doubtless serve most efficiently. October has been selected as meeting time in future.

Gen. H. H. Duncan, in turning over the command of the division to General Blitch, made his final report, and gave a stirring talk which was appreciated by all the veterans of the 60's.

Brigade Commanders. During the week the various brigades met and named commanders as follows:

First Brigade—Gen. R. D. McLeod of Crawfordville, commander.

Second Brigade—Gen. W. T. Weeks of Starke, commander.

Third Brigade—Gen. B. C. west, re-elected.

General Blitch has named Col. W. A. Rawls of Pensacola as adjutant general and chief of staff of the Florida division.

"On each of the three evenings which the veterans spent in Jacksonville they were delightfully entertained by the daughters of the Confederacy, and at all of these they were treated as the guests of honor. No more delightful reunion has ever been enjoyed than this one," say the local veterans.

**NEW SANITARY ORDINANCE TO PASS TODAY**

ATTENTION OF CITY COMMISSIONERS IS CALLED TO INADEQUACY OF WATER SUPPLY.

At the regular meeting of the city commissioners yesterday the sanitary ordinance was read the second time and by unanimous consent a special meeting was set for two o'clock today at which it will be brought up for final passage.

The comptroller's report for April was presented and ordered filed. The report indicated something of the nature of the city's financial problems which require careful consideration.

By resolution adopted, J. O. Walker was formally inducted into the office of comptroller, to begin his duties today, while Heinberg was formally reinstated in the clerkship, to resume its responsibilities at the same time.

The Pensacola Engineers club, through its secretary, V. R. Dunlap, called the attention of the commissioners in writing to the inadequate water supply of the city, and volunteered their assistance in planning an adequate water system.

The petition of citizens for the repaving of Garden the street extension having been referred to City Attorney Jones for an opinion, he reported that the city could not legally let the work to John Gerkins under the contract for paving Second street.

The bid of Lazare Lacoste for casino concessions at Bayview Park was rejected because not accompanied by a bond.

The request of the Standard Oil company for permission to sink two new oil tanks on their property at Gadsden and Tarragona streets, was referred to Commissioner Hinrichs.

A communication was read and filed from Manager J. A. Jones, of the Isis theater, asking that a deadline be provided around the fountain in Malloy Square, to prevent the congested parking of cars around the fountain and make it possible for animals to reach the watering place.

The matter of the Texas Oil company bulkhead did not come up and it is understood that the matter will not be pressed further, and that work on the big project will not be interrupted.

Dr. Lischkoff has returned and will resume practice.

**SMOKE FROM CITY TRASH PILE IS CAUSE OF PROTEST**

Residents of East Romana street in the vicinity of Alcaniz, are objecting strongly to the smoke from the city trash pile fire. E. J. Quina of 325 E. Romana declares that the smoke from this fire is so dense and foul-smelling at night that he and his family are unable to sit on the porch of their home, and that other residents of that community report the same unpleasant conditions.

It appears that the city crematory is not large enough to burn all the trash and the paper is thrown into the swamp and burned by night. Residents of that section of the city will again appeal to the commissioners, it is said, and if relief is not forthcoming will endeavor to obtain redress through the courts.

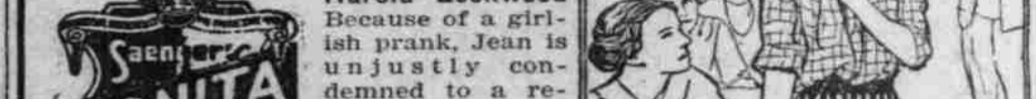
