REPORT ON BAYOU TEXAR UNFAVORABLE

REASONS FOR REPORT AS STATED THEREIN ARE THAT DEVELOPMENT WOULD NOT BE NECESSARY TO COMMERCE.

Report unfavorable to the improvement of Bayou Texar, by government funds has been made by W. D. A. Anderson, colonel of engineers, in charge of the U. S. engineer's office, at Montgomery, Ala., and the reasons therefor are stated in the following communication to the Journal by Mr. Anderson, with reference to the contemplated project and others of local interest:

'It having come to the notice of the undersigned that you have expressed an interest in the pending proposition for the improvement of Bayou Texar (Pensacola Bay, Fla.) you are hereby informed that the report thereon, authorized by the act of congress approved March 2, 1919, has been made and is unfavorable to the improvement. The principal grounds upon which the adverse conclusion are based are: Improvement of this bayou would develop no commerce, except in facilitating the removal of timber, which can be floated out in small rafts; improvement of the bayou would not develop a public utility for commerce; a harbor of safety for small craft has been developed at Bayou Chico, and necessity for the development of an additional facility of this character is not apparent.

'You are further notified that all interested parties have the privilege of an appeal from this conclusion to the board of engineers for rivers and harbors, a permanent body sitting at Washington, D. C., to which all examination and survey reports of this character are referred. Parties desiring to do so may be heard on appeal by this board, either orally or in writing. Written communications should be addressed to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, Southern Building, Washington, D. C., and should be mailed in time to be in possession of the said board within four weeks from the date of this communication. If, however, you have important data to communicate to the board, which can not be collected and put in shape for prompt presentation within four weeks, the board should be informed of this fact without delay, and request made for an extension of the limiting date for submitting information. If oral hearings are desired, dates for the same may be arranged for by correspondence with the board.

'Any further information needed may be obtained by application to this office, but attention is invited to the following regulations as to the manner in which such information may be furnished: 'Where interested parties desire, data necessary for the preparation of their appeal to the board of engineers for rivers and harbors, it will be given verbally by the district officer, or, in his absence, by the senior as-

SENATE BILL DISPLEASES COMMISSIONERS

COUNTY GUARDIANS WILL NOT AGREE TO TAKE \$20,000 OUT OF NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET FOR ONE PROJECT.

Dispatches from Tallahassee yesterday indicated that the state senate had passed a measure at the instance of Senator J. P. Stokes, authorizing the county commissioners of Escambia county to issue warrants for \$20,000 for twelve months to provide money for building the Millview-Lillian road across the Ferdido river. It was indicated that this sum of money would then be paid out of the taxes to be assessed and collected next year.

It was stated by officials at the court house, however, that the action had been taken without the knowledge and wish of the county commissioners, and that the legislation would not be acceptable to them unless it should provide for spreading the payment over more than next year's budget. The commissioners had made it plain at their special meeting Wednesday that they could not spare as much as \$20,000 in next year's budget for the Millview-Lillian road without depriving other enterprises to an unwarrantable sum usually applied in the budget for this district, to the proposed improvement in the west end of the county, and Commissioner Gandy also agreed that he could not relinquish a large sum; but Commissioner McCurdy felt that with the 600 miles of road to be maintained in his district, no curtailment could be made; and the other members seemed agreed that his position was reasonable. Not more than \$10,000 was thus seen to be available from the next budget.

The commissioners avowed that they were anxious to see the road improved as soon as possible and as well as possible, and that they would do all in their power; but that as custodian of all the interests of the county they must insist that if \$20,000 be spent at this time, arrangement must be made by legislative enactment to spread the cost over two or more years.
