PERRY TELLS WHY SOUTH FLORIDA WANTS TO SECEDE

BY JOHN C. TRICE. Tallahassee, June 6.—Subsequent to the refusal of the house to take up his reappointment bill, Mr. Perry, of Lee county, prepared and furnished to the press for publication, the following statement:

Over sixty per cent of the entire state taxes are paid by that portion of the state lying south of the arbitrary line drawn for state division in the Mathis resolution. A substantial majority of the house were willing that South Florida should secede, but a minority prevented. Against the wishes of the majority, this large tax paying portion of the state is compelled to pay its lawful part of the taxes toward the support of a waste from which it has expressed the wish to secede.

It is doubtful whether the Mathis resolution would have received a dozen votes if reappointment of the legislative body had been made as contemplated and provided for by the plain mandates of the constitution of the state of Florida. The legislature has again refused to take any action looking toward the remedy of the constant and cumulative evil arising from the unequal development of the several parts of the state, through the consideration and adoption of a just re-appointment bill under the present constitution.

The legislature has also refused to approve by the necessary majority a resolution providing for a constitutional convention which convention would probably remedy the unjust apportionment as it now exists and as it has existed for thirty two years. This is worse than taxation without representation. It is taxation without hope of representation.

New York, June 6.—The cotton

market showed renewed weakness this morning. Yesterday's closing rallies were not only lost, but prices made new low ground for the movement, owing to less favorable reports from the goods trade and better weather than expected in the south.

Live pool was lower than due and the market here opened easy at a decline of 26 to 49 points under liquidation, southern, western, local and Liverpool selling. There was some irregularity right after the call, but July soon broke to 29.55 and October to 28.50, or 57 to 62 points net lower.

There was trade buying around 28.50 for October and the early break was followed by rallies of about 20 points on the demand from that source and covering. The prospects for good weather over the week-end served to check buying otherwise, however, and the market was quiet around mid-day with the tone steady, although rallies were not fully maintained.
