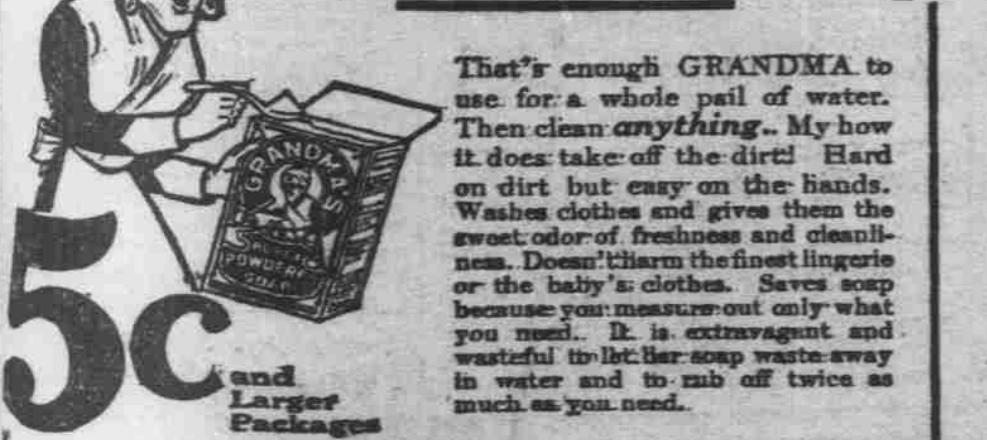

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS MEET JUNE 9 TO 11

PENSACOLA DISTRICT INSTITUTE OF ALABAMA CONFERENCE WILL BE HELD AT FLOMATON.

The occasion next in importance after the centenary, among Methodists of this district, is the District Sunday School Institute for the Pensacola district of the Alabama Conference, to be held at Flomaton, Ala., June 9-11. This institute will be composed of representatives from the 50 or more Methodist Sunday Schools in the district and covers the following counties: Baldwin, Conecuh, and Escambia, also Pensacola, Fla., and intervening Methodist Sunday Schools.

Each school is to send three delegates in addition to its pastor and superintendent. It is understood that a strong program will be rendered. Speakers from the conference headquarters at Montgomery, Ala., will be in attendance and there will be an out of state speaker to deliver inspirational address. Among the topics that will be discussed are such as "The Child's Religious Heritage," "A Far-Reaching Program," "The Right of the Child," "The Teacher Evangelist," "Sunday School Day," "An Enlarged Vision," etc.

It is urged that each school select its delegates at once, three in addition to the superintendent and pastor. L. V. Holsberry, of Pensacola, is president of the district; Miss Bessie Baggett, superintendent of the home department, Atmore, Ala.; C. T. Livingston, superintendent teacher-training, Belleville, Ala.; Prof. Ira Powers, Wesley Bible Class superintendent, Brewton, Ala.

The conference headquarters are located at 36-37 Vandiver building, Montgomery, Ala. The Alabama conference keeps a strong force in the field promoting, instructing and building up Methodist Sunday Schools. PALMER PLANS IMPROVEMENTS THIS SUMMER

The twelfth session of Palmer College has just come to a close with the commencement exercises held from May 31 to June 4. Every exercise demonstrated the high ideals of the institution and showed the splendid work done by this young and growing West Florida college. Announcements of plans for future growth and development were received with great pleasure by the friends of the college, and it is believed that the next year will bring a large increase in equipment and patronage.

He showed the danger of the church leaving her old moorings to enter new fields, and made an earnest plea that the church remain true to her Lord.

"The Holy City" was the selection for the sacred concert given on Sunday evening. The splendid oratorio was beautifully rendered by a choir under the direction of Miss Elizabeth Martin, the head of the music department of the college. The children of the elementary department presented the operetta, "Boy Blue," in the Chautauqua auditorium on Monday evening. They elicited much applause by the excellence of the rendition. The grand concert by the departments of music and expression was the attraction of Tuesday evening. The final exercises were held in the auditorium on Wednesday evening. Judge Thos. F. West, associate justice of the supreme court, Tallahassee, Fla., addressed the graduating class, which consisted of Misses Irene Clary, Marie Alice Flournoy, Essie Montez Sutton, and Messrs. Raymond Wickersham and John Lauchlin McDonald.

Dr. W. B. Y. Wilkie, Dunedin, Fla., presented the diplomas to the graduates. The McKinneon medal awarded by the faculty to the best all-round student, was won by Raymond Wickersham. President Kemper announced that thirty thousand dollars had been subscribed for a new administration building to be erected this summer. He also announced the gift of a splendid pipe organ for the new auditorium from Mrs. R. E. L. McKinnon. The campaign is to continue immediately to secure an additional five thousand dollars for improving the girls' dormitory and general repairs. A successful year thus closed with a promise of large development in the near future. Palmer is about to receive the recognition which has long been her due.
