SOUTHERN STATES WELL REPRESENTED IN NATIONAL FEDERATION BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN.

With the state convention of business and professional women of Virginia, which met in Richmond Friday and Saturday and formed state federation to affiliate with the national federation to be formed in St. Louis July 14-18, the nine states within the territory of Mrs. Nina B. Price, southern organizer, will have federated. North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Arkansas had preceded Virginia. Most of these states have elected their delegates to the national convention and the personnel of the business and professional women in each who have been first to perceive the value of the federation idea, indicates that the southern representation in St. Louis will compare favorably with the delegations coming from any other section of the country.

The national business women's committee, composed of active business and professional women from every state headed by women of such high note as Ida Tarbell and Elizabeth Marbury, is behind the federation movement.

It is so composite that it is non-partisan, non-political and non-sectarian. The federation will frankly be just what the member clubs make it. If every club of business and professional women enters the federation in the formative stage, it will never become either partisan or one-sided. "The way to get what you want out of an organization is to put the right spirit in it," states woman leader.

Plagues are rapidly coming from general and civic clubs of business women, from lawyers, doctors, advertising women, Y. W. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. clubs of business girls, who see in it a wonderful guide toward business honesty and success. The convention will discuss what it takes to make a thorough business woman. The constitution and policies of the federation will be formulated at St. Louis on the basis of what clubs want done—training, higher standards employment facilities, better balance in the salary and the mental scale and the right kind of living conditions.

The best way to come into the federation is to join before the July convention. Any club can still vote to federate, send a resolution signed by the club president to the organizer in that district and select a delegate to St. Louis.

Among the things to be gained from attendance at the national convention

will be that it will get business and professional women out of the rut; they will get a chance to give whatever they have by way of ideas, efforts or suggestions; they will get much stimulus from meeting with successful women in every line; they will become better known and get new line on themselves by contrast with other women.
