SUICIDE OF DOCTOR WILKINS, ALLEGED WIFE SLAYER PROBED

Mineola, N. Y., July 1.—The manner in which Dr. Walter K. Wilkins came into possession of the rope with which he hanged himself in the bath room of the Nassau county jail here last night was the subject of an investigation begun here today by Charles R. Weeks, district attorney; Walter R. Jones, acting coroner and other county officials. Dr. Wilkins, convicted last Friday as the slayer of his wife, Julia, was to have been sentenced to death tomorrow morning to death by the electric chair at Sing Sing prison.

Every precaution had been taken to prevent Dr. Wilkins from obtaining anything with which he might attempt suicide and his jailers were unable to explain how he came into possession of the rope which was new. It was impossible for any one from the outside to throw the rope to the prisoner for his cell contained no windows. The bathroom where Dr. Wilkins ended his life also was without windows. A search of hardware stores and other places where rope is sold was to be made today in an effort to trace the purchaser. One of the three letters written by Dr. Wilkins just before he ended his life, declared that he was innocent. Another addressed to Sheriff Phineas Seaman requested that \$60 in his clothes be used to have his body cremated. Mrs. Julia Wilkins for whose death her husband was held responsible was beaten to death on the night of February 27 last in the driveway of her Long Beach home, her skull fractured by a hammer and a piece of lead pipe. Dr. Wilkins claimed both he and his wife had been attacked by three burglars whom they had surprised at work when they returned home.

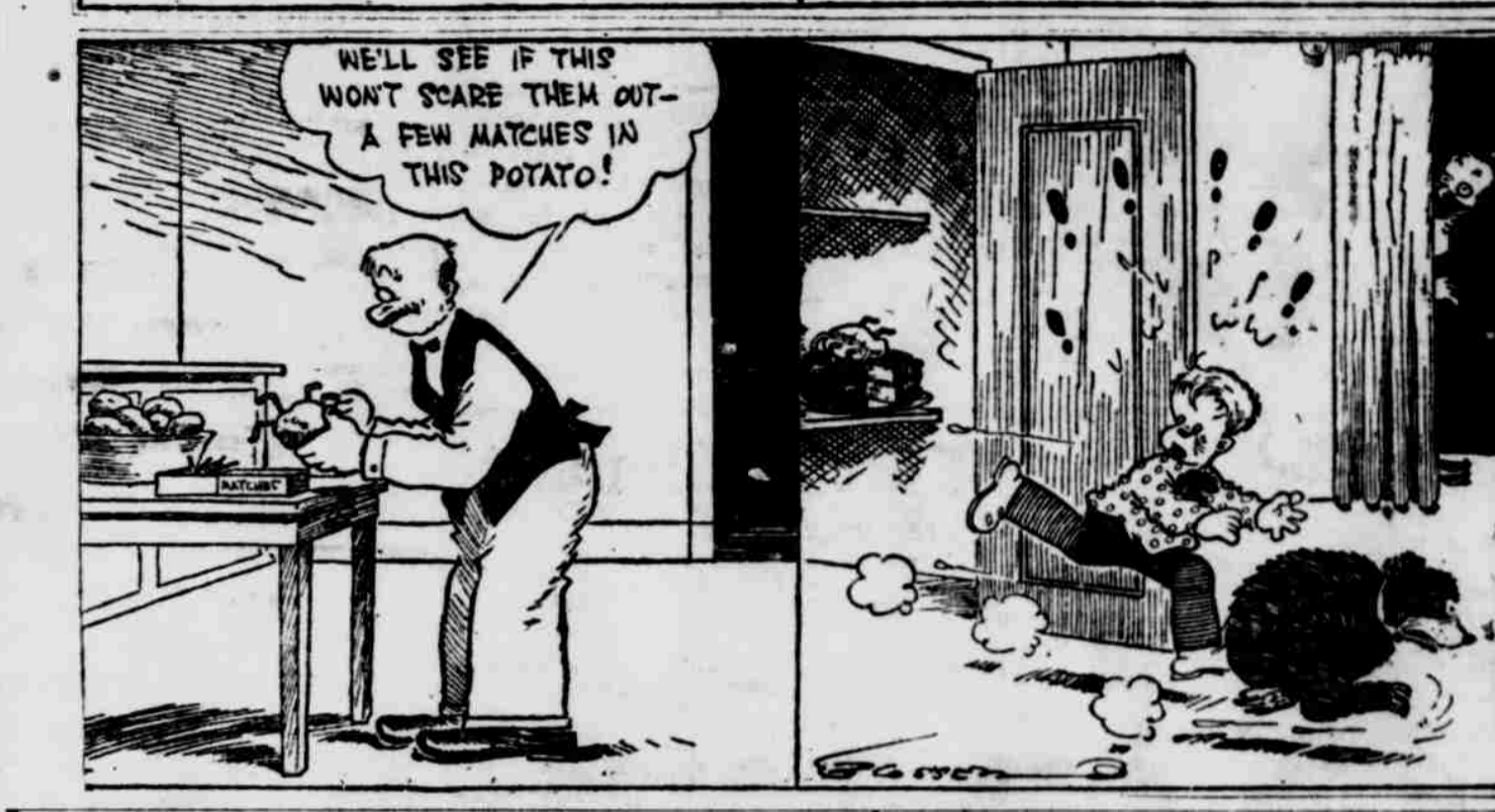
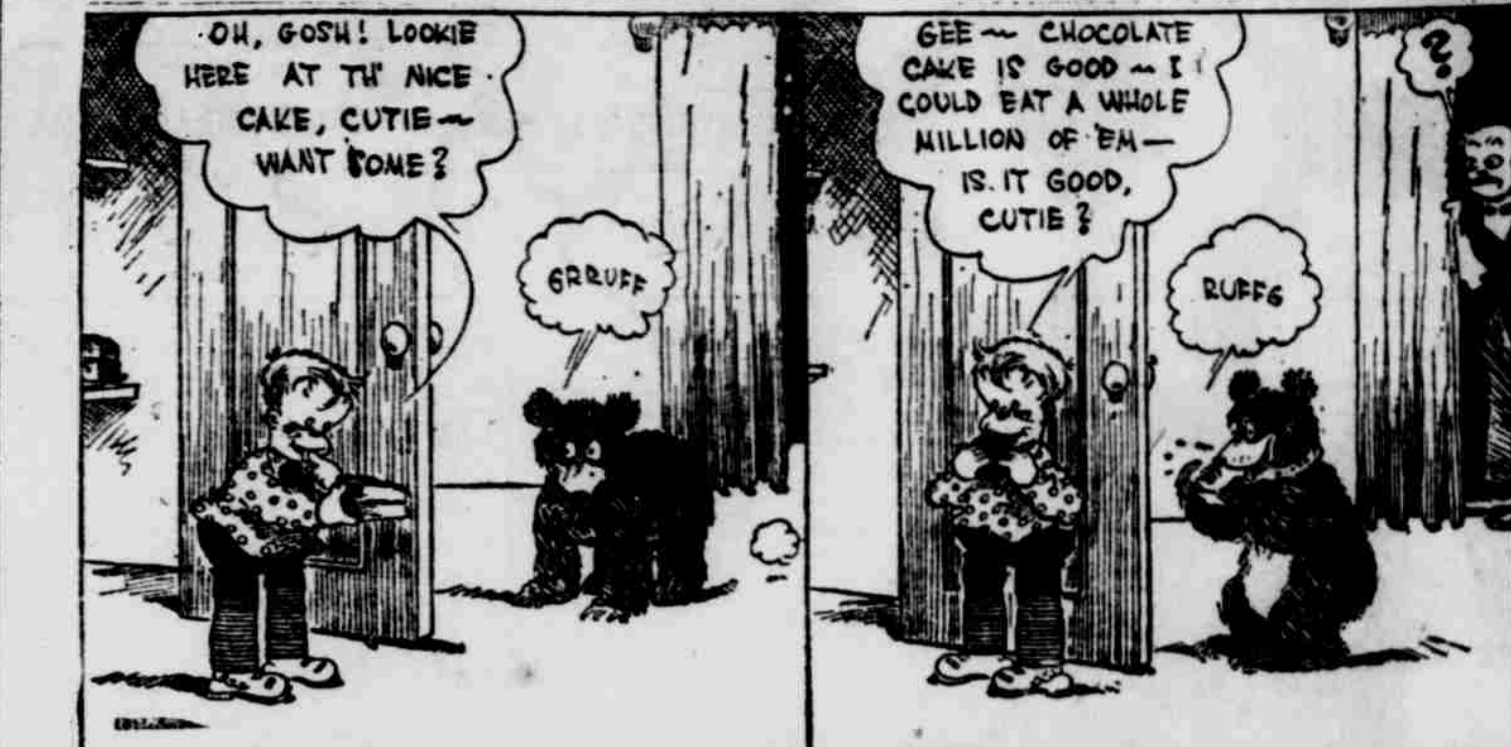
