TUSKEGEE SCHOOL TRAINING THREE COLORED SOLDIERS

Washington, July 2.—Whether your left eye is gone, or your right hand is shattered, or your left arm stiff, you still have a chance to realize that ambition that has been knocking at the back of your head all of your life. This was the decision of three negro

soldiers who fought valiantly and were discharged from the army disabled. Two of them had been born and raised on the farm, and they wanted to go back to it, but they wanted to go back prepared to be good, scientific farmers. That is what Tuskegee and the federal board for vocational education is doing for them now.

The other one had dreamed of machines from the time he stood wide

eyed around the first automobile that came to town, and here he is now studying motor mechanics, and getting nearer and nearer his idea.

The Federal board for vocational education, headquarters at 200 New Jersey avenue, Washington, D. C., with 21 branch offices in different sections of the country, makes a business of helping these boys to win out vocationally against any and every handicap—and they are winning out.

DIXIE NEWS SERVICE IS LAUNCHED BY AN ATLANTA CONCERN

Atlanta, Ga., July 2.—Bringing together some of the most noted editorial, publicity and advertising specialists in the south, the Dixie News Service, with headquarters at Atlanta, has recently come into the field of advertising-publicity concerns and to a degree has created a new field for itself. Heading the organization are G. K. Rutledge, who resigned the publicity directorship of the Y. M. C. A. in the southeast to take up work with the organization; Allan C. Gettschadit, present associate publicity director of the American Red Cross in the southern states; and J. Clark Brown, whose work as an advertising expert is favorably known throughout the south and in New York and New England.

The publicity for the nation-wide campaign now being waged is being handled in the southern states by the Dixie News Service. To aid in this work the organization has secured the services of Tarleton Collier, well known southern journalist and writer, who leaves the city editorship of the Atlanta Georgian to join the "Dixie News" forces.

With officers at 326-7-8 Healey Building, Atlanta, Dixie News Service is well equipped to take charge of all forms of publicity and advertising. Specialists in copy writing, special editions, campaign drives and the preparation of sales letters and booklets include such men as Ward Greene, feature writer and overseas correspondent of the Atlanta Journal; Dudley Glass, special writer on the Atlanta Georgian; "Old Bill" Keeler, the widely known feature writer on the Georgian; Ward Morehouse, of the editorial department of the Atlanta Journal; Ralph Jones, of the Atlanta Constitution; Clyde C. Stogner, former South Carolina newspaper man; Harry O. Mitchell, editor of "Ferreteria," and expert advertising expert; Rod S. Davis, Georgia journalist; Don Mitchell, recently returned from overseas with the 27th division to take up the position of treasurer of the Dixie News Service, and a corps of experienced advertising solicitors.

Wanda Hawley is Leading Woman in "Secret Service."

Lovely, charming and talented Wanda Hawley plays the leading feminine part in "Secret Service," William Gillette's famous drama of the Civil War, in which Major Robert Warwick is featured and which will be presented as a Paramount-Artcraft special at the Isis tomorrow.

"The Woman Thou Gavest Me," Hall Caine's Masterpiece Splendidly Picturized.

Most people have read Hall Caine's masterpiece, "The Woman Thou Gavest Me," and those who have not probably will sooner or later. Either class will enjoy the remarkable presentation of this story upon the screen at the Isis theater, where it opened to a packed house and was received with acclaim yesterday. The picture was directed by Hugh Ford and is a Paramount-Artcraft special of the highest class.

A cast of super-excellence interprets the characters. Katherine McDonald is Mary; Jack Holt is Lord Raa, Alma Lier is played by Fritz Brunette, Milton Sills does Conrad and Theodore Roberts is Daniel, the stern father of Mary. The aunt is played by Katherine Griffith. The settings and locations of the exterior scenes are alike realistic and beautiful. The picture covers India, Africa, England, Egypt and the Antarctic. Every scene is vividly portrayed.

The story concerns Mary MacNeill, married to a man she hates, Lord Raa, a rake and a beast. She refuses to be more than wife in name and he goes his way with an affinity. Mary meets an old lover, Martin Conrad, an explorer, and they are thrown together in Africa and in the heart of the immensity, they are played with by

Fate as the wind toys with the desert sands.

Martin goes back to the south polar regions and Mary with her child is in London. Then she hears he is dead. Lord Raa returns from India and Mary's father, who has forced the hateful marriage upon her to satisfy his own selfish ends, insists that the husband shall be sponsor for the child. But Mary escapes with the baby and goes to London. In the end she is forced upon the street and accosts a man who emerges from a dense fog. It is Conrad, back from the dead, searching the world for Mary. Raa obtains a divorce and Mary and Conrad are united at last.

The dramatic features of the story are deftly and delicately handled, yet always with a vigor that makes them convincing. The direction throughout is highly artistic.

Miss MacDonald as Mary, is exquisite and gives a wonderfully strong performance. The same may be said

of the others and in every way this picture offers the best possible entertainment for those who like real drama which wrings the heart but which ends happily for those who deserve happiness.
