three rounds; \$100 to \$500 that Willard does not respond to the call for the seventh round. In the pari-mutuel betting, the heaviest play is being made on the seventh and eighth rounds, while Dempsey is almost a 2 to 1 favorite, according to the number of tickets sold, on the result should the bout go the full twelve rounds.

With their training grind ended Willard and his youthful challenger planned to spend today in complete rest. The champion planned a motor ride out the country this afternoon to escape the eyes of the curious, and go to bed early tonight.

A brisk walk was the program for Dempsey this morning. Jack Kearns, manager of the challenger, planned to take him on a motor spin through the country this afternoon to keep his mind off the contest and also to avoid the crowds which have flocked to the challenger's camp in ever-increasing numbers.

CLAIMS COMRADE KILLED SHERIFF AFTER ARREST

Nashville, Tenn., July 3.—Rexford B. Peters killed Sheriff Stevens, of Williamson county, last Friday night, according to the authorities here, who said Donald Vorhies, arrested with Peters and brought here today for safe keeping, had given them a statement to that effect after their arrival. Peters, officials said, later collapsed in his cell.

Both of the men, who are about 20 years old, were in a buggy with the sheriff, who, it is understood, had them under arrest for a minor infraction of the law. According to the alleged statement of Vorhies, he had fallen asleep in the buggy and was awakened by a shot. He then heard a second shot and could distinguish the sheriff's face by the flash made by the gun.

The fathers of both Vorhies and Peters visited Governor Roberts at the state capital this morning and thanked him for taking precautions to guard their sons from threatened mob violence. Both of the prisoners are 21 years old. Peters collapsed in his cell just before his father visited him there.

FRENCH LOSSES IN KILLED ARE OVER A MILLION

Paris, Wednesday, July 2.—The total French losses in killed and missing on land and sea, as officially established up to the day of the armistice, November 11, 1918, amounted to 1,366,235.

These figures were given the chamber of deputies today by Deputy Louis Marin, in a report on the disposal of the effects of missing men.

The losses of the French army were 1,088,709 killed and 265,800 missing, or 18.2 per cent of the total mobilized force of 6,410,000.

The losses of the navy totaled 16,735, of which 5,521 were killed and 5,214 are missing.

LITTLE MONEY IS PLACED ON EITHER BOXER

MOST MONEY IS WAGERED IN FREAK BETS—MARQUIS OF QUEENSBERRY RULES TO BE FOLLOWED.

Toledo, Ohio, July 3.—The meeting of the principals and various officials of the Willard-Dempsey championship bout here tomorrow to decide upon the rules to govern the contest, passed without a hitch. It was decided that Willard and Dempsey should box according to the Marquis of Queensberry rules with the kidney punch and side chop blow barred. In clinches they may box to protect themselves until the referee orders them to break, at which both must step back without hitting in the breakaway. In all other respects the same rules which have governed the heavyweight championship contests of the past will be in force.

There were no changes made in the personnel of the officials, notwithstanding many rumors to the contrary. Major Anthony J. Drexel-Biddle of Philadelphia will act as one judge, while Tex Rickard will serve in a similar capacity. Ollie Precord of this city will be the referee with Jack Skelly as alternate ready to take Precord's place in case the necessity should arise. W. Warren Harbour of New York will be the official time keeper. The two judges will sit on opposite sides of the ring and not together as originally planned, this change being made at the request of Dempsey's manager.

Those present at the conference were Tex Rickard, W. A. Gavin, representing the board of boxing control; Jack Kearns, manager of Dempsey; Referee Precord; and a representative of the champions.

Betting on the outcome of the bout has proved surprisingly light to date notwithstanding the gathering of thousands of prospective spectators. It was estimated this morning by one of the foremost wagering commissioners that there was not much more than \$10,000 in actual stakes in the hands of the various betting concerns. He explained this situation upon the theory that while the adherents of the two heavyweights were sharply divided in their opinion of the result, each contingent had too much respect for the fistic ability of the rival contender to lay heavily on the chances on their own favorite.

In some quarters sentiment appeared to be veering towards the champion for while Dempsey backers were offering even money on the challenger a day or two ago, they are now asking that Willard men lay ten to eight. Even when these odds are granted the switch does not result in any large sums being turned over to the stakeholders. At the leading commissioner's quarters the blackboards are filled with various betting preparations which have remained untaken with the exception of a few freak bets for several days. Some of these include \$100 to \$1,000 that Willard does not last
