Lexington, Va., Oct. 22.—Football "hope" as to what the Generals will do when they go up against V. P. I. and Georgia Tech, is being freely issued here as a result of one big score made by Washington and Lee against the Norfolk naval base last Saturday. It is whispered that Coach Rafferty, desirous of a little insight on how the Generals may handle themselves when they strike their big rivals, let his warriors loose against the Tars and told them to go in for all they were worth. Whether this be true or not, it is certain that little was left of the sailors after the first half. Four sets of backs rolled up a total of 28 points before they could be stopped and sent to the "barn." Rafferty took his first siring backs out of the game after the first few minutes of the play, substituting second varsity men, who did equally as well. Finally the sailors were left to the mercy of the scrubs and the Generals wrapped themselves in their pants and retired. During the entire game "Big Ed" Bailey, Mattox, Corbett and Collins were kept on the sidelines on account of minor injuries sustained in scrimmages. Stevens, who has been indoors for the past two weeks, was out with all his usual speed, "pop" and power.

PRINTING CONTRACT TO BE LET TODAY

Tallahassee, Oct. 22.—(Special)—The secretary of state, the attorney general and the state treasurer, a committee from the board of commissioners of state institutions yesterday took up the matter of letting the contract for the printing of the new revised general statutes, bids for which were opened on the eighth instant. Besides the members of the committee, Senator Calkins of Fernandina, who made the revision, was present. It was deemed essential before proceeding to have certain information, and accordingly a telegram was sent to the Tampa-Tribune Publishing Co., one of the bidders, asking for certain information. A reply received by wire this morning stated that the firm desired to have a representative appear before the committee to give such information. The committee will receive this representative on Thursday, at which time the contract will be let; and a telegram has also been sent to the E. O. Painter Printing Co., the other bidder, to give that firm an opportunity also to send a representative. The committee desires expert advice in order to determine the merits of the respective bids. Senator Calkins has also been notified and will probably be present. It is understood that Mr. Crawford and Mr. Luning will certainly be present, although it is understood that Mr. Swearingen will be out of the city. Mr. Crawford stated this morning that the contract would be let on Thursday.
