INTERNATIONAL TRADE ILLS UP TO CONFERENCE

HUNDREDS OF WORLD'S GREATEST BUSINESS MEN MEET IN EFFORT TO DIAGNOSE AND PRESCRIBE FOR TRADE ILLS.

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 23.—Hundreds of the world's greatest business "surgeons," men high in affairs in the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Belgium, met here today at the opening session of a three days' "clinic" to diagnose international trade ill and prescribe for the cure. The first day was spent largely in the organization of committees and other preliminary work.

The International Trade Conference, as it is called, is being held under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Among the notables who are invited to speak are King Albert, of Belgium, Herbert Hoover, A. C. Bedford, chairman of the board of directors of the Standard Oil Company; Sir Arthur Shirley Benn, M. P. of England; Eugene Schneider, head of the Creusot works, the "steel king" of France, Florimonde Hankar, of Brussels, director of the National Bank of Belgium, and Fernando Quartieri, formerly head of the Italian delegation to the interallied munitions council.

Ten committees, named by an executive committee of which Mr. Bedford is chairman, are to submit surveys and reports on American trade and financial conditions for the information and guidance of the thirty-six foreign delegates. The topics are as follows: Credit and finance; chemicals; food-stuffs, coal, oil, metals, shipping, textiles and permanent organization. Of all these committees none, perhaps, is more important than the one on credit and finance, headed by James S. Alexander, president of the National Bank of Commerce, of New York.

Discussing the objects of the credit and finance committee, Mr. Alexander said: "It is to study the question of re-establishing normal trade relations between the United States and the nations of Europe, to provide an opportunity for a frank discussion of facts and an exchange of views with our visitors from England, France, Italy, and Belgium. Neither the foreign delegation nor the American committee is in any sense official."

"It is hoped that a discussion around the table of the facts and the principles involved may serve to expedite the re-establishment of sound credit conditions, based upon a renewal of understanding and confidence, and steadily increasing production. The objective in the minds of business men appears to be to place foreign



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trade on a normal basis, and not, except so far as the immediate emergency demand, to crystallize and perpetuate abnormal conditions by un-

usual methods. "In other words, the committee's aim is to search out, with all possible speed consistent with soundness, the ways and means by which the nations of Europe can freely carry on full trade relations with the United States along business lines, lines economically sound, commercially desirable and reciprocally beneficial. Those elements form the only basis for relations which can be permanent."

HOG CHOLERA SERUM TO BE DISTRIBUTED

State Sanitary Live Stock Board Making Preparations.

Tallahassee, Oct. 23.—The State Live Stock Sanitary Board has closed a contract for the purchase of anti-hog cholera serum and virus under the provisions of the law passed by last legislature at ninety (90) cents per one hundred (100) cubic centimeters, at which price it will be sold by the Board to the hog raisers and farmers of this state. This is a saving of fifteen (15) cents per one hundred (100) cubic centimeters over the lowest price made in the first bids received, which were rejected as unsatisfactory. This price will mean a saving of forty (40) per cent of the price that has heretofore been charged by most of the reliable manufacturers.

The law provides that any hog owner can secure an amount up to 1,500 cubic centimeters, which is sufficient to inoculate thirty well hogs of one hundred pound weight at one-half price, the other half being paid for by the state. All applications for serum and virus for which the state pays one-half must be made upon regular forms of application which may be had from any federal or state veterinarian or other person authorized to administer the same and must be approved by such authorized person, and in all cases, must be accompanied by post office or express money order or cashier's check in an amount sufficient to pay for same. It will be useless to order serum and virus in any other way than that specified above, as under the law, the Board cannot fill orders except those made in the prescribed way.

It has been arranged to have a supply of serum and virus on hand by the first of November and all orders can be filled after that time.

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
