CARUSO SUPPORTS CAPTOR OF FIUME

Mexico City, Oct. 23.—Enrico Caruso, here for a series of concerts, has sent 5,000 lira to Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio to help him during his occupation of Fiume, according to an interview published by El Heraldillo de Mexico. Signor Caruso says that he does not know anything about the politics or diplomacy involved in D'Annunzio's act, but he does believe that Fiume rightfully belongs to Italy and for that reason he supports the Italian poet, right or wrong.
"This is merely a personal matter," said the singer. "I myself do not mix in politics. I do not believe that any artist should enter the political field unless he is willing to lose his art. Look what it has done to Paderewski."

NO NOTES OF COUNCIL.

Paris, Oct. 23.—A. Aulard, one of the leading authorities on the revolution, says he fears the future historians of the peace conference will have great difficulty in giving an accurate account of the deliberations of the supreme council, or the "Big Five," which framed the terms of peace with Germany. He concludes from statements made by Premier Clemenceau that no complete records were made of the deliberations of the council. Notes were taken, according to one version, but by different persons, and in several languages.
