MOBILE EXPECTS DIFFICULTY IN TODAY'S GAME

WRIGHT'S SCHOOL SAID TO BE LIGHTER THAN PENSACOLA HIGH AND TO LACK EXPERIENCE.

Mobile, Oct. 24.—(Special)—Outweighed in every department, and outpointed in experience, the Wright's school eleven enters the game with Pensacola High tomorrow afternoon with little odds to offer except a determined spirit of fight that has carried many a team to victory over a superior opponent. The game is called for 2:30 o'clock at Monroe Park and unless J. Pluvius sets into the game with a royal flush in the guise of another hard downpour, local football enthusiasts should be treated to a good gridiron classic.

Overton, U. of A., will officiate as head linesman. Other officials will be named today. Coach Oswald of the local eleven, declares that although his machine will be out-weighted and lacking in veteran experience, it will not be beaten until the final whistle sounds. The soggy condition of the field will tend to stack the odds in favor of the Pensacollans, for the lighter but fleetier machine will not be able to function at normal speed. RAFTERY SAYS SILVERSTEIN IS BEST IN SOUTH

WASHINGTON AND LEE HAS WONDERFUL LINE-PLUNGING BACK WHO IS PICKED TO BE ALL-SOUTHERN OR ALL-AMERICAN.

Lexington, Va., Oct. 24.—Head Coach Raftery of the Washington and Lee "Generals" declares that in "Bullet Joe" Silverstein he has the best line plunging fullback in the South. Inter-viewing regarding this brilliant player, Coach Raftery said:

"Not only is Silverstein one of the most terrific line plungers I have ever seen, but I am certain that his defensive work cannot be excelled by any player in the South. The man is a terror with a football. He weighs about 178 pounds, is built low, and hits the line with a speed that reminds one of Percy Wendell, the old Harvard back, and Joe is as hard to down as Johnny Maubetch, of Michigan. If Joe can't find a hole he bores one through; and it's going to take a good team to stop him."

Followers of the Washington and Lee team seem to have the same opinion as Coach Raftery concerning Silverstein. The fact of his having played such brilliant ball at the University of Pennsylvania early this season, as well as his showing here in the past three games, marks him as a dangerous man for Washington and Lee's opponents.
