RAILROADS ASK RATE INCREASE OF COMMISSION

Washington, Oct. 23.—Increased rail transportation rates to offset the increase in operating expenses during federal control is sought immediately from the interstate commerce commission by the railroad corporations following a decision reached today after a conference between Director General Hines and representatives of the association of railway executives. Hines said the government had no intention of initiating advances, but will furnish data for railroad owners. There is no indication of how much advance will be asked.

HEALTH BOARD CONTINUES TO MAKE REPORTS

The work of inspecting the school children of Pensacola was entirely completed yesterday when the children of Clubb's Annex and the remaining colored schools were examined. The work in the rural districts has also continued all week. The following report is made:

Clubb's Annex—Anemia, 15; enlarged glands, 5; pulmonary diseases, 4; hookworm, 2; defect orthopaedic, 2; conjunctivitis, 7; defect of vision, 33; defect of nasal breathing, 3; defect of teeth, 20; enlarged tonsils, 40; total defects, 223. 131 pupils, 1.7 percent defects per pupil.

St. Joseph's (Creole)—Anemia, 1; enlarged glands, 7; pulmonary diseases, 4; hookworm, 2; conjunctivitis, 13; defect of vision, 8; defect of nasal breathing, 2; defect of teeth, 12; enlarged tonsils, 15; total defects, 64. 67 pupils, .95 per cent. defects per pupil.

St. Joseph's (colored)—Anemia, 2; enlarged glands, 16; pulmonary diseases, 4; defect orthopaedic, 1; conjunctivitis, 16; defect of vision, 7; defect of nasal breathing, 1; defect of teeth, 6; enlarged tonsils, 21; total defects, 68. 197 pupils, .63 per cent defects per pupil.

School No. 104 (colored)—Anemia, 5; enlarged glands, 18; pulmonary diseases, 19; cardiac disease, 1; defect orthopaedic, 4; conjunctivitis, 44; defect of vision, 69; defect of teeth, 16; enlarged tonsils, 28; total defects, 195. 264 pupils, .73 per cent defects per pupil.

Dr. Grace Whitford went to Century today and the night of the twenty-fifth leaves for New Orleans where she will read a paper on "School Hygiene for Rural Communities" before the American Public Health Association. She also serves on the organization committee of the Child Hygiene Section of the association and on the question committee of her section. She expects to return to Pensacola on Friday, the thirty-first. During her absence, Dr. A. C. Hamblin of Tampa will be in charge of the work.

Dr. Tatom will also be in New Orleans next week at the meeting of the association.

COBLENZ IS GAY AS ARMY POST

U. S. Soldiers Remain There; Wives Live in Y. W. C. A. Hostess House.

Coblentz is taking on very much the air of a big American army post since our officers there have been permitted to send home for their wives, according to Miss Ruth Woodsmall of Denver, Colorado, who has just returned from Y. W. C. A. Hostess House work in France and Germany. "The number of women war workers in that area is very much decreased," says Miss Woodsmall, "but the government has asked that the Hostess House be kept open until the first of January at least, for the officers' wives who are living in Coblentz and for the Y. W. C. A. girls stationed there."

The Hostess House at Coblentz was one of the most popular German hotels of that city before it was requisitioned by our government as a billet for American women in Germany. It has living accommodations for forty-
