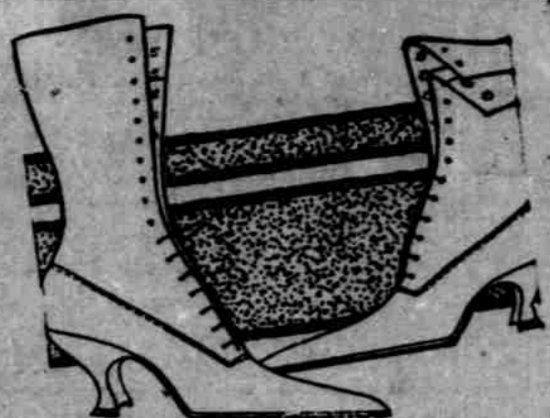

CASH PRIZES FOR LIFE INSURANCE ARTICLE

Award Goes to Parents, Boy Having Died in Attempt to Save Life.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 1.—Fifty-one acts of heroism were recognized and rewarded by the Carnegie hero fund commission at a meeting here today.

In addition to these many grants, awarded: in forty-six cases, bronze medals. Thirteen of the heroes lost their lives, and to the dependents of three of these pensions aggregating \$2,150 a year were granted; to the dependents of six of the others who lost their lives, the sum of \$3,750 was granted to be applied as the commission may sanction. One of the heroes sustained injuries, and he was granted disablement benefits in the sum of \$500 to reimburse him for his loss.

In addition to these many grants, in seven cases \$10,000 was appropriated for educational purposes, payments to be made as needed and approved; and in twenty-seven cases awards aggregating \$23,500 were made for other worthy purposes. Payments in the one-sum cases will not be made until the beneficiaries' plans for the use of the awards have been approved by the commission.

Sam S. Wollner, Montgomery, Ala., saved Henry O. Haven from drowning at Santa Rosa island, June 18, 1916, and received a medal.

Ernest Ward, deceased, Atmore, Ala., saved A. Ewing Wright and J. Raleigh Potts from drowning at Shelbyville, Tenn., April 24, 1915, and received a bronze medal.

MACHINISTS PROTEST TEN CENT COFFEE

Local Union Votes to Refrain from Drinking the Beverage.

The machinist local union has adopted a resolution which charges that cafes are profiteering in the matter of charging ten cents per cup for coffee and calls on all union men to refrain from buying any more coffee in cafes so long as the price remains at ten cents.

Delegates have been appointed to bring the resolution before the two central councils and urge them to take similar action.

ALIEN ANARCHISTS MAY BE DEPORTED

Senate Committee Reports Favorably on Bill at Request of Palmer.

Washington, Oct. 30.—At the request of Attorney General Palmer the senate immigration committee today ordered a favorable report on the house bill providing for deporting and permanent exclusion from the United States of alien anarchists.

The house measure provides for deportation of aliens interned during the war.

The bill affects four women and about 500 men now interned as dangerous aliens at Camp Oglethorpe, Ga., and Fort Douglas, Utah, according to Attorney General Palmer.

"Included among those interned," the attorney general wrote, "are revolutionary radicals, anti-American propagandists and individuals known to be, or suspected of being, enemy agents."

"Unless this bill or a bill similar in character is passed, it will become necessary on the ratification of the treaty of peace to set all of these dangerous individuals free."

NO SYMPATHETIC STRIKE IS BELIEF

Governor Roberts Says Indications Are General Walkout Will Not Be Called.

Nashville, Oct. 30.—"Indications now point to the fact that a sympathetic strike will not be called at Knoxville," said Governor Roberts today, in discussing the street car strike at Knoxville, where state and federal troops are encamped as a precaution against possible disorder.
