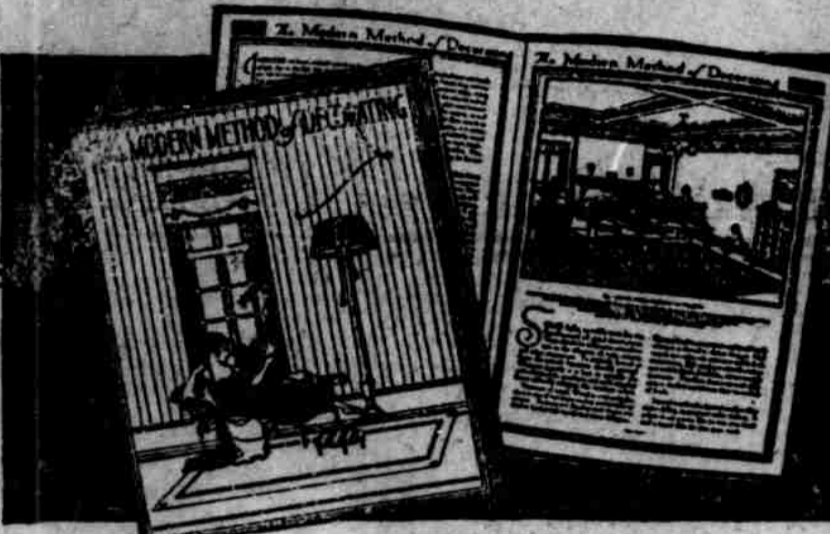

GOOD ROADS MEET TONIGHT

NEWLY ORGANIZED ASSOCIATION TO HOLD IMPORTANT SESSION. PEOPLE OF BAKER ORGANIZE.

The Escambia County Good Roads Association, organized at the San Carlos Hotel Monday, will hold a meeting tonight on the mezzanine floor of the San Carlos at 7:30 o'clock. The subject of the Gulf-Atlantic Highway, New York to New Orleans, and other matters will be under consideration. It is the purpose of this association to reach throughout the entire county for membership, and it is therefore desired that everyone who would be interested in a trunk highway from New York through this city, or any road project in Escambia county become a member of this association.

If you are already a member be sure and show your interest by your presence. If you are not now a member and feel within you a progressive spirit on the highways or good roads subject consider this as a personal invitation to be present and become a member to aid in getting the best possible for this section by pulling together. Highway projects are being pushed in practically all parts of the country and it therefore is important that this section get busy.

Realizing the possibilities of the Gulf-Atlantic Highway—New York to New Orleans—the people of Baker and vicinity organized yesterday for the purpose of using their strength and influence to the limit for the designation for the route that way.

W. M. Herrider (Highway Bill) who had been requested by the people of Baker to organize them for this purpose, addressed a very enthusiastic audience on the subject of the Gulf-Atlantic, and the plan of organization.

Dr. R. B. Crawford who is connected with the Kan-Fia Lumber Company, of Holt, headed a delegation from Holt and Galliver with a proposition to tap the Spanish Trail at Galliver instead of at Milligan as this would give a road on a perfectly straight line from Andalusia south to the Spanish Trail. Dr. Crawford following Mr. Herrider, made a strong address setting forth the necessity for organizing and pledged the support of Holt in membership and activity.

The people of Baker and Holt have confidence in their ability and their proposition to win and hold friends for this route.

The following officers were elected: J. P. Moore, president; J. W. Kierce, vice-president; B. Robison, secretary-treasurer. The executive committee is composed of the following: Dallas Peaden, J. W. Mainor, Dr. G. O. Spears, Dr. R. B. Crawford, J. W. Stanley, Jeff Franklin, and R. O. Stewart.
