Many of the resignations are those of young officers, graduates of Annapolis, who have served their required eight years, and find it impossible to support a family properly on the navy pay.

The warrant and petty officers of the navy, who are the real backbone of the service, are the real backbone numbers to take positions ashore at their trades of electricians, engineers, machinists, etc., at three and four times the pay given by the navy.

The navy pay increase bill now un der consideration will probably be reported favorably to the house next week if congress is still in session, or early in December if adjournment is taken soon. The bill is certain to get prompt consideration in both the senate and house at the December session demoralized, and hence inefficient in order to extend relief to the navy men as soon as possible.
