ALCANIZ WHARF TO BE BUILT

COMMISSIONERS ALLOW FRANCHISE FOR SPUR TRACK OF L. & N. R. R. ON CHASE-ST.

What the Commissioners Did.
Granted franchise to L. G. Crosby. Granted franchise to W. B. Ferris. Will readvertise for bids for city wells. More assistance given city engineer. Claims presented for Special Chief Penton. Ordinance considered for building inspection. Petition for cancellation of tax certificate. Considered ordinance for repairing of tracks of G., P. & N. That St. Nicholas has the right of way this time of the year was evident yesterday afternoon when the city commissioners were locked out of their own council chamber on account of supplies of Christmas cheer being stored in the council hall. The supplies, consisting of fruits and candies, belonged to St. Nicholas and the keeper had the key to the hall. It took some time to get into the room before the city dads could carry on their official meeting.

The authority to build a wharf at the foot of Alcaniz-st., granted to W. B. Ferris and associates, was passed on third reading.

The right of L. G. Crosby to construct a spur track from his place of business on Chase-st to the L. & N. tracks was also granted upon third reading of the ordinance.

The commissioners will re-advertise bids for the digging of two wells for the city. This advertisement was run during the month, but owing to the time not being set for the opening of the bids some contractors asked that the bids be re-advertised. Only one bid had been received and representatives of that firm withdrew their bid to allow the city to further advertise.

Resolutions from the city engineer were adopted asking for more rodmen. This resolution asked for 10 additional rodmen. Resolutions were also adopted for putting in equipment for the burning of fuel oil in the city water works.

Mr. Fisher was present at the meeting in behalf of Chief of Special Police Penton and asked that the city reimburse Mr. Penton for injuries received by him recently when he was run down by Fire Chief Riera's car. Mr. Fisher was asked to present his claims in writing at next meeting.

MISS ROBERTA CRAVEY KILLED IN JACKSONVILLE

Quincy, Dec. 22.—Quincy was greatly shocked today when it became generally known that Robert Howard Cravey, the 13-year-old daughter of Mrs. Headie Cravey Purvis, of Jacksonville, had been killed yesterday in an auto accident. The child was in the car with a family returning from gathering Christmas decorations and the machine was struck by a train, some of the other occupants of the car are also dead.

Mrs. Purvis was born and reared in Quincy and little Roberta's early life was spent here. The child's uncle, Julian Howard, has charge of the funeral which will be held at the eastern cemetery in Quincy Tuesday morning.

NEGRO TAKEN WITH STOLEN CAR

Jack Daniels, negro, was arrested yesterday by Capt. Harper for being suspiciously in possession of a Dodge car. Upon investigation it was found that the car had been stolen in Montgomery and that the police there were looking for it. A reward of \$50 was offered for the return of the car and the arrest of the thief.

Daniels admitted that the car had been stolen but refused to give any details.

It is alleged that he drove a car to Montgomery and returned with this one. He had procured a Florida state license and was operating as a jitney, but failing to take out a license for that was the cause of his undoing.
