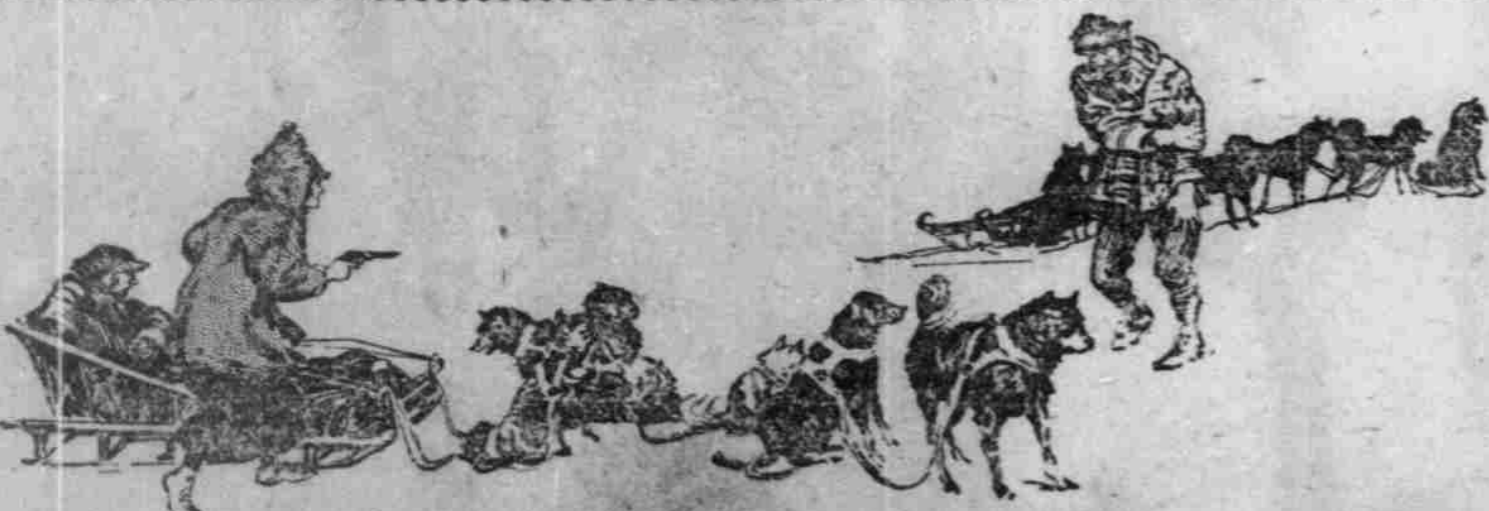

**MEXICO STIRRED BY EARTHQUAKE**

Mexico City, Jan. 4—Scores of persons were killed in a violent earthquake which occurred in many parts of Mexico last night. Center of the disturbances is believed to have been near the volcano of Orizaba.

Incomplete reports indicate the state of Vera Cruz suffered the worst of any, although it was felt throughout the Republic.

Reports say 30 are dead in one village and unconfirmed reports place the same in another. There are 50 victims, including numerous dead at Jalapa. Lack of communication with small towns makes even approximate estimates of casualties impossible. The earthquake caused great alarm in large cities.
