SCIENCE BOARD NAMES COLLIER

IS MEMBER OF ORGANIZATION FOR PROMOTION OF SCIENCE IN SOUTHERN STATES.

Gainesville, April 10.—President A. A. Murphree announced today the appointment of the following chairmen to represent the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Southern Education Society in their districts: B. B. The American Association for the Advancement of Science is one of the most important scientific organizations in the world. Its 12,000 members include not only the leading scientific workers of the country but also a large number of progressive people of all callings interested in the promotion of science in both education and industry.

The Southern Education Society is now the only South-wide organization devoted to the study of the problems peculiar to the south and to this end it is creating a number of commissions made up of our best brains to deal with our pressing questions. The society was affiliated with the association at the recent session in St. Louis to bring about effective cooperation of science and particularly the use of scientific methods in business as well as education.

Authority has been conferred by both bodies on the chairmen to name the initial members who will be members of both bodies and receive the weekly journal "Science," the official organ of the association, which is one of the ablest and most readable of our scientific publications.

The southern states as a rule are each naming five hundred members and it is expected that Florida will not only be in the list but head it. "No man," added President Murphree, "can measure the results of having five hundred of our constructive citizens in constant touch with the advancing scientific thought of the world. With this membership in this great international organization Florida will get a recognition she can get in no other way."

METHODISTS TO PLAN REUNION

Des Moines, Iowa, April 10.—Proposals for a reunion of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church South will be considered at the quadrennial conference of the former body which is to be held here beginning May 1. Hundreds of delegates from all parts of the United States and many from foreign countries, will attend this gathering of the supreme law-making body of the Methodist Episcopal Church which includes not only the legislative but judicial and administrative branches of the church government.

Commissions from the conferences of this organization as well as the Methodist Episcopal Church South have approved plans for the reunion of these two great Methodist organizations and discussion of this project is expected to be one of the chief questions to be decided. It is expected that as usual, some of the delegates will ask the church body to liberalize its attitude toward dancing and other amusements. Pronouncements will be made on education, temperance, capital and labor, morals, marriage and divorce, child labor, evangelism, immigration, evangelization and Christianization of the foreign element, world-wide missionary operations and kindred subjects. Selection of new bishops will be one of the most important purposes of the meeting. Their number will be determined by the Committee on Episcopacy. Usually from six to ten new bishops are named. Being the highest office in the church, the position is much sought for. In addition, editors of the various church publications and other offices will be elected. Delegations will include both ministers and laymen and women will be admitted as lay delegates.

BOOK PROGRAM AGAIN PRAISED

GENERAL WOOD WRITES LETTER OF PRAISE TO LEADERS OF "BOOKS FOR EVERYBODY" MOVE.

Heartly commendation of the "Books for Everybody" movement of the American Library Association is contained in a statement by Major General Leonard Wood, United States Army. General Wood, who is on leave of absence from official duties to conduct his campaign for the Republican nomination for the presidency of the United States, declared that he is heartily in sympathy with the enlarged program of the A. L. A. and its broad purposes.

"During the war," said General Wood, "I followed the work of the association closely, both at Camp Funston and in the Central Department. It performed invaluable service to our men, both as means of recreation and of education. I wish the association the heartiest success."

The "Books for Everybody" movement is designed through libraries and other agencies to bring to the 60,000,000 persons in the United States now inadequately served, library service that will meet their needs and points

to a time when books will be freely accessible to every man, woman and child in the country. Its purpose is to open every avenue of self-education through the printed page, thus making better citizens and fostering the spirit of American ideals, institutions and traditions. To carry out the broad provisions of the program, a fund of \$2,000,000 is now being obtained, not through an intensive drive, but by the individual efforts of librarians, library trustees and friends of libraries.

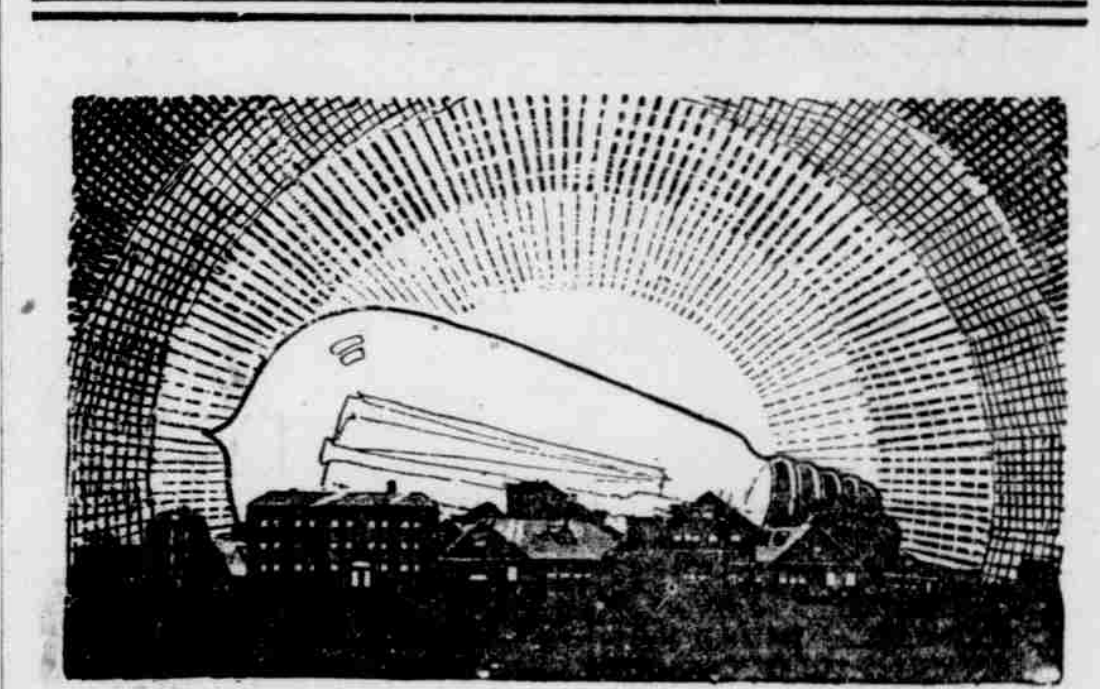
