GLOVE HELPS IN SWIMMING.

Device With Concave, or Shaped Surface, Enables Swimmer to Get Better Grip on Water.

In order to increase the effective area of a swimmer's hand, an inventor has provided a glove consisting of an elastic web formed with concave stalls in which the fingers and thumb may be inserted. The glove is attached to the wrist by means of a strap.

The cot's are made of work material, so that they have a tendency to grip and bind the fingers to prevent the glove slipping off, says Scientific American. The outer edge of the web is curved downward, forming a concave shaped surface, which will grip the swimmer to secure a better grip on the water.
