## BRYAN WINS OVER BLOUNT IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF 1,500

A Much Larger Vote Was Polled In Second Primary, Madison County So Far Reported Gives Bryan Majority of 135.

From returns so far received, Hon. N. P. Bryan of Jacksonville has won over W. A. Blount of Pensacola with a majority varying according to different reports from 1,300 to 1,800 votes. The vote was much heavier in the second primary than in the first held on Jan. 10th. Mr. Bryan made heavy gains in South Florida counties and overcame the lead which Blount received from West Florida.

In Madison county Bryan made big gains as will be seen by referring to the table below.

### MR. BRYAN MAKES STATEMENT.

Mr. Bryan made the following statement to the Metropolis of Jacksonville at noon yesterday:

"From the returns so far received I am informed that my majority is about 1,700. Later returns may increase or reduce this lead slightly, but I consider it settled beyond question that I have been nominated. I would like to have the papers state that I take this one method of expressing to my friends throughout the State my gratitude for the confidence expressed in me. As soon as I see two or three days I will write some personal letters, but even that method will not enable me to reach the many thousands of my unknown legal friends."

## MADISON SUFFERS FROM \$8,000 FIRE

Much Excitement Created Saturday Night by Burning of Madison Motor Car Co's Garage.

The fire began at Madison Saturday night and took for its prey the garage of the Madison Motor Car Co. in which was stored their used automobiles, many gallons of gasoline and oil and their entire repairing outfit.

The garage was entirely destroyed and all of its contents for when the fire was first discovered the flames were leaping high in the air and it was seen at once that the building was doomed. \$8,000 would be a low estimate as to the loss of the company were it not for the fact that same was fully covered by insurance.

Stored in the garage was two automobiles belonging to the company besides one belonging to J. E. Harden and one to J. McC. Lucin. Messrs. Harden and Lucin carried insurances on their cars also.

The company will be ready for business again in a few days and they are now contemplating the erection of a fire proof garage at an early date of which material will be made as soon as plans and specifications are completed.
