Special Term of Court.

Special term of the Circuit Court called by Judge Palmer for the county convened Monday. The case on change of venue in Columbia county, the defendant E. J. Watson, a white man, and Frank Reese, a negro, they were indicted for the murder of John, white, in Columbia county. The case has been tried here this year, the trial having been held in Hamilton county in a mistrial. The case which excited the people of the county greatly, all the concerned being prominent. A special venire of 47 citizens of the county was ordered from which a jury and at this writing is being chosen.
