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A MATTER OF MONEY. "The Exposition interests of Florida in their present aspect are not cheering. Other states have ample funds, partly appropriated and partly subscribed, for carrying on the work of appropriation, while lack of a general fund in Florida threatens to paralyze, and even suspend entirely the earnest efforts which many individuals are making.

Of course, the exposition business cannot remain long in this condition of financial uncertainty without results being injured, and even partial success imperilled, and the question is—what is to be done? The only course seems to be that public spirit and State pride must assert themselves for their cash value, and a general subscription throughout the State make up the required sum.

The local organizations could solicit subscriptions in their respective counties, a part to be used in their own work and a part to be contributed to a common fund to be disbursed for the interest of all in the uses to which we have referred above.

But this general subscription is uncertain, and now is the time when some generous capitalists might step forward and make for themselves records which would be as monuments, for Florida could not forget that she had citizens who did with open hand all that other States accomplished by force of legal enactment; that their free-offerings balanced the sums of appropriated tax money in other commonwealths.
